In the last edition of Faith in Lambeth we highlighted that Lambeth Council and the Metropolitan Police were hosting Peace Week 2010 from 18 to 25 September. It was a chance for the whole community to celebrate diversity, equality and most importantly promote harmony across Lambeth. Throughout the week there were array of events enjoyed by young and old. Below are just some of the highlights.

On Sunday 19, faith organisations took part in the second 'Faith Together in Lambeth' picnic held in Windrush Square, Brixton. Over 100 people of different faiths, traditions and those of no nominated faith enjoyed listening to music, poetry and songs whilst enjoying food from Buddhist, Christian, Jewish, Hindu and Muslim communities across the Borough.



Thursday 23, it was 'Time for Change' held at Lambeth Town Hall. The purpose of this event was to bring the community together and encourage those who attended to think about their community and how they could make it a better place. It was a chance to re-evaluate their thoughts and beliefs. Everyone who took the stand had a message that was thought provoking and the audience began to realise they had lots to offer. As a result 25% of the attendees signed up to become volunteers. If you are

Friday 24, The Gospel Café hosted 'The Power of Peace'. Set in a living room style setting, the mixed audience enjoyed inspiring performances from a host of entertainers, an open mic session, group discussions, a film and interviews.



Holocaust Memorial Day is a day for everyone and will be commemorated in Lambeth on Sunday 23 January.

The Holocaust was a tragically defining episode on the 20th century. Millions of lives were destroyed or changed beyond recognition under the Nazi regime of hatred. Families, communities and towns were totally wiped out. When the world learned, for the first time the scale of the destruction wrought between 1933 and 1945 it vowed 'Never Again'. The subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Bosnia, Rwanda and Darfur have shown that there is still much to be done to make this undertaking real.



The human race which caused the disease of genocide also has the remedy. This is the legacy of hope we must pass to our children.

It is easy to talk about the numbers murdered and persecuted during the Holocaust and the subsequent genocides. It is less easy to truly appreciate what these figures mean. The 11 million people murdered by the Nazis were not a statistic. They were individuals. Somebody's friend. A mother. A father. A child. A colleague. A neighbour.

There are some stories from the Holocaust which we know. We are familiar with Oskar Schindler, who saved 1200 Jews from death and concentration camps because his remarkable story was told in the 1993 film Schindler's list. For every story we know in this way, there are many millions more which we do not. Now is the time for these **Untold Stories** to be heard.

We at Lambeth will be holding a memorial day on **Sunday 23 January 2011 at Lambeth Town Hall, 3 – 5pm**. We are asking you all to come and join us to remember the victims of Nazi persecution and those who were murdered under exclusionary policies in Cambodia, Bosnia, Rwanda and Darfur. Together we will honour the survivors of those genocides and consider those whose stories will never be told as well as hearing from one survivor who will speak out for the first time.

By hearing a survivor's story we have not heard before, we can understand the need to live in a society which values difference and does not discriminate against anyone based on their race, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, disability or gender. The past can assist us in celebrating the society we live in today.

Employer Forum on Belief Award goes to Lambeth

Lambeth beat off strong competition to win 'Best Public Sector Overall,' at this year's prestigious Employer Forum on Belief (EFB) Awards, for our work to promote faith and belief equalities in the workplace.

The EFB awards recognise the innovative ways religion or belief discrimination is being tackled in the workplace. This year we stood out against some strong competition from organisations including Kent County Council, the Home Office, Ministry of Justice and Staffordshire Police.

The awards were announced at an evening reception on Tuesday 13 July. On presenting the award, Trevor Philips, Chair of the Equality

and Human Rights Commission, described our nomination submission as "a highly impressive and comprehensive entry which should act as an inspiration to other London boroughs and councils across the UK".



St John the Evangelist, Brixton

Thursday morning towards the end of the summer holidays and what a wet day it was. Julian, Daniel and I visited St John the Evangelist Church in Brixton to talk to children and young people of various ages about the Islamic faith. Upon arrival, we noticed that the parish had constructed a large tent outside the church to accommodate the carers and children who were playing outside. We were kindly greeted by Revd Rosemarie who shepherded all the young people into the tent and seated them at tables which were each assigned a continent.

Julian began the event by introducing himself and explaining briefly the work and goals of the forum, followed by Daniel who gave an insight into his work in the forum alongside his beliefs. Likewise I introduced myself and stated my beliefs and work within the forum.

Julian began a dialogue between himself and Daniel by asking Daniel an array of questions about Islam. Julian often emphasised his Christian beliefs prior to asking about Islam due to the fact that the school was a Christian school. Daniel responded by giving a detailed answer often followed by a run-up question by Julian.

Prior to the dialogue initiating, Rosemarie had told the children to pay careful attention to the answers as they would later be taking a quiz to determine which table (continent) paid the closest attention on the topic of Islam.

After the 20 minute dialogue between Julian and Daniel, the floor was open to questions. Many students raised their hands, keen to get answers to questions they had thought of during the dialogue. Many of the girls were keen to have answers about the issue of burqas and hijabs, wanting to know if they are compulsory within Islam or optional. After the cluster of questions, the children were given a booklet of questions which they had to answer within their assigned group.

After writing down their answers, Rosemarie began giving the correct answers and reviewing answers from the various groups. After taking the Islamic test, the children were given a Christianity test. Some children were accused of cheating but the hilarious issues raised simply added to the festive mood.

Overall, the visit was enjoyable and it was great to interact with the children not only on an educational level but also on a religious and social level. I trust we destroyed many stereotypes (if any) that the young people had in their minds and hearts regarding Islam and I hope that our visit to educate children and young people will be the first of many.

Whatever do the 2012 games have to do with Lambeth's churches?

For Lambeth churches the 2012 Games are a once-in-a lifetime opportunity. But they are coming 'ready or not'.



David Willson, CEO of More Than Gold, encourages every church to do something for the Games

The 2012 London Olympics and Paralympics present the UK with its greatest logistical challenge since the last war. They also present the churches with one of their greatest opportunities ever – and that includes those in Lambeth.

'What the churches of the UK seem to be best at,' says Rev Canon Duncan Green, the Church of England's top man for the Games, 'is being where people are not. And here's a great way for churches to be where people are. To join in the party and do those things the church does best'.

And this is what has been happening around the world at Summer and Winter games for almost two decades. For example –

- In Atlanta, churches gave out over 3 million cups of cold water to visitors on the streets.
- In Sydney, churches ran over 100 sports clinics for disadvantaged young people
- In Beijing, over 30 teams of creative artists performed in pubs, clubs, malls, coffee houses and orphanages
- In Salt Lake, the churches provided the largest number of homes to host the families of athletes

Now the baton has been passed to the UK. Which gives churches a great opportunity to use acts of service and outreach to engage with their communities.

Daunting though this may sound, help is at hand. The main denominations have established More Than Gold, a temporary agency to help every church make the most of the Games.

The CEO of More Than Gold is David Willson. He's spent almost twenty years coordinating the Christian response to more than forty major sporting events around the world – including the Olympics. David says, 'There is something appropriate that every church can do in the context of the Games. And we are coordinating the skills and experience of over sixty Christian agencies to provide the resources and training that will help them'.

Among a vast range of resources in preparation are children's holiday club materials with an Olympic theme. And on tap is a pub-style sports quiz for church members to invite their friends. David adds, 'For the churches in Lambeth there are extra opportunities to host the families of the athletes, volunteer to provide a welcome and advice on the streets.

More Than Gold is asking every church to appoint their own 'Gold Champion' – someone to receive a steady but not overwhelming supply of information to help them pick what will work the best for them during the coming year as well as the weeks of the Games.

◆ BENEFIT ENTITLEMENT....ARE YOU MISSING OUT?

Every year thousands of people across the UK miss out on benefits that they are entitled to. It's important that you aren't one of them and that you don't miss out.

Did you know....

- ◆ 50 per cent of people working who could be entitled to housing benefit are not claiming?
- ◆ You could get assistance with paying your council tax, even if you own your own home?
- ◆ You could make an online claim for housing benefit and council tax benefit by logging onto Lambeth's website?

If you have answered 'no' to any of these questions and have not made a recent claim for housing benefit and/or council tax benefit, why not visit www.lambeth.gov.uk/benefitsonline? You will be asked to complete a short calculation, which will tell you how much benefit you could get and then you can claim your housing benefit and council tax benefit straightaway.

It is an easy to use, secure method to apply for benefits and by applying online the time it takes to process benefits claims is reduced. This means that people who claim online could get their benefits sooner. Alternatively, you could contact Lambeth benefits call centre on: 0345 3022312.

◆ GRASSROOTS GRANTS

Grassroots Grants offers funding for organisations and groups working in local communities. The funding is available for projects until March 2011.

If your group ticks all the boxes, you can apply for a

Grassroots grant of £250 - £5000:

- ◆ a not-for-profit voluntary or community group in England;
- ◆ led by volunteers;
- ◆ active in local community 12 months or more;
- ◆ average income (over three years) of less than £30,000 per year;
- ◆ works for the benefit of your local community.

◆ DO YOU KNOW A VULNERABLE PERSON WHO MAY BE SUFFERING FROM ABUSE OR MISTREATMENT

- ◆ Did you know that 4% of older people living in their own home report being abused or mistreated?
- ◆ Are you aware that older and vulnerable people from Black and Minority Ethnic groups are less likely to report when they have been treated badly?
- ◆ Do you know what to do to help an older or vulnerable person who you think may be being abused, neglected or mistreated?

Lambeth aims to be a borough where there is zero tolerance of abuse of older and vulnerable people. It has been recognised that this can only be achieved if every citizen and every organisation takes responsibility for helping to safeguard old, frail and vulnerable adults.

Faith Groups have a vital part to play in protecting vulnerable adults.

- ◆ They can often be the only link with some isolated individuals
- ◆ They could be the only group that some vulnerable adults trust.
- ◆ They are often working with adults that are most at risk.

Who is a vulnerable adult? Anybody who is unable to look after themselves due to a health problem, this includes dependency on drugs and or alcohol and those needing treatment for mental health problems.

People who have a learning or physical disability.
People who are frail due to old age or a physical illness

What is abuse? Abuse includes physical harm including misuse of medication and failure to provide food and drink, theft, fraud and sexual abuse. It also includes shouting at the person, denying them contact with others or the outside world, or name calling, graffiti or damage to property on the grounds of race, faith or disability.

What can you do to help? Do all you can to make sure the person is safe? Report the abuse or support the vulnerable adult to report the matter. You can do this by contacting **Lambeth Adults' and Community Services on 020 7926 5555** (9.00am to 5.00pm) or **020 7926 1000** (outside office hours)

If you work within a faith organisation let somebody in authority within the organisation know (even if the vulnerable person is reluctant to report it).

Finally if you think a crime has been committed encourage the person to report it to the Police. You may need to report it on their behalf particularly if you think there is a possibility that others could be harmed

◆ **LAMBETH PSYCHOLOGICAL THERAPIES SERVICE**

Opened its doors in September 2009 and has recently expanded so that even more people in Lambeth can access psychological treatment more easily.

The service is based in GP surgeries, health centres and community bases all over Lambeth, where we work with people struggling with common problems such as depression, stress, anxiety, phobias, anger, eating problems, sleep difficulties, and low self-esteem. People can access a range of help and advice depending on their needs. There are several types of help available. People can access guided self-help, where someone would work through self-help material with the support and guidance of a trained practitioner (this can be in person or over the telephone). We offer cognitive behavioural therapy, which helps someone address what is keeping the problem going, and aims to change thoughts and behaviours to change the way a person feels. This can be provided one-to-one or in a group. Additionally people can access a computerised cognitive behavioural therapy programme, Beating the Blues, online at home. The service also provides help for people who have work problems related to their difficulties. In addition to treatment, we help people find other services that

they might find useful such as debt advice services, help with housing, voluntary services etc.

To access psychological treatments, people can call us for a brief telephone assessment. People can also be referred by their GP. The service is available to people who live in Lambeth or who are registered with a Lambeth GP. Please call 020 3228 6747 to access the service. In addition to providing psychological help, part of the team provides information and help with mental wellbeing.
