- 2 (9.58 am)
- 3 THE CORONER: Can I just for the record say thank you very
- 4 much for those who very kindly sent in submissions on
- 5 rule 43 reports, which I have read with interest and
- 6 taken on board some of the points that have been raised.
- 7 They were very helpful.
- 8 I'm planning to send out three Rule 43 reports after
- 9 the verdicts have been handed out tomorrow.
- 10 MR COMPTON: Thank you.
- 11 (In the presence of the Jury)
- 12 THE CORONER: Members of the jury, good morning. Thank you
- very much for coming in. Do you have any questions or
- 14 any issues you need to raise? No, shaking of heads.
- 15 All right, thank you very much. So, please, could
- 16 you carry on with your deliberations and preparing your
- 17 narrative verdicts. Please, if you could liaise with
- 18 Mr Graham and Mr Clark when you have something that is
- 19 ready to go, as it were, and then the proposal that
- I shall make on that is that I will then look at it
- 21 really just to ensure that it doesn't fall foul of the
- guidelines that we gave you a little while ago.
- 23 So once you've passed it through to me, I shall ask
- you to remain in the building until I've just had
- a chance to look through that, okay, but then we can

- 1 come back to the mechanics of that later on, all right?
- 2 So, please, go back to your room and carry on.

- 18 points and have them done within half an hour to
- an hour, but we felt it was better to address them
- 20 properly than do it briefly and get back to you earlier.
- 21 THE CORONER: Of course, I quite understand, we're not
- rushing you at all, understood. Very well, how much
- time would you like to have for a lunch break, what
- 24 would suit you?
- 25 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: I think I might need an hour,

- 1 Madam Coroner.
- 2 THE CORONER: Okay, that's fine. Shall we see you back in
- a hour's time and ask you to carry on and complete
- 4 perhaps?
- 5 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Thank you very much.

- 11 THE CORONER: Thank you, members of the jury, are you back
- 12 refreshed from lunch? Good. Do you feel up to
- 13 continuing this afternoon? Good, well done. In that
- 14 case, please, would you be kind enough to do so and let
- me have a message through Mr Graham and Mr Clark when
- 16 you've completed what you want to write.
- 17 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Thank you.

- Members of the jury, thank you very much indeed for

 letting me see your document and thank you very much for

 all the careful thought and hard work that has gone into

 it. I do appreciate that.
- On the face of it, it appears to be one narrative 5 and doesn't on the face of it very obviously distinguish 6 7 between the six deceased, although I can see that 8 there's a point part way through where maybe your focus 9 moved from one to others. We do need separate 10 narratives in respect of each of the deceased. That's going to sound like rather a daunting task at the 11 12 moment, so we're just giving some thought as to how we 13 could best help you to deal with that.
 - I'm not going to ask you to begin that tonight, you've had enough for today I think, but please if you could be back tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock as usual, and we hope that by 10 or shortly afterwards we'll be able to give you some help with the way forward in actually achieving the narratives that we need for each of the deceased, all right?
 - So for the moment, thank you very much, and please come back tomorrow for a start at 10, and we'll see you then. Thank you very much. Good night.
- 24 (In the absence of the Jury)

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25 THE CORONER: Yes, so those of you who are here, just to

expand a little bit on that. As you heard me say, the narrative which the jurors have let me see doesn't appear on the face of it easily to distinguish between the six deceased and so we need to give them some help in trying to achieve that.

I've just been discussing with Mr Maxwell-Scott whether we might perhaps do this by getting the document typed, and giving them access to a laptop so that they can do some cut and pasting and actually achieving six separate documents, or something of that sort.

Anyway, it's a matter on which I think that plainly we need to canvas opinions from all properly interested persons, and so we'll try and get that done shortly.

I think it would be very helpful if all PIPs would come tomorrow morning at say 9 o'clock, because plainly tomorrow's going to be quite a packed day. I think if we can have a discussion with PIPs at 9 o'clock, work out how we're going to help the jury to complete their task, and there may well be one matter where it may be that I need to give them a direction as to a passage that needs to be deleted.

So again we'll canvas submissions on that. So can we leave it at the moment that we'll circulate something if we can this evening, but if everyone could be here at 9 o'clock then that would be very helpful. Okay? Thank
