
Alex Wheatle – Cane Warriors live reading with music Saturday 2 October, 2pm Windrush Square, Brixton Library steps, SW2 1JQ

Afruika Bantu Saturday School Memorial Lecture: The 40th Anniversary Of The Brixton Uprisngs (1981 – 2021): Where Are We Now? Saturday 2 October, 2pm to 6pm St Martin's Community Centre. Abbots Park, SW2 3PW

Recommended Donation: £5 (Aged 25 and over). Everyone else Free

In 1981, outrage, blood, fire, turbulence, resistance, grief and defiance were the explosive responses to decades of micro/macro racisms experienced daily by Black people in the UK. Institutional failings compounded by police harassment/brutality became the sparks that ignited the 1981 Brixton Uprisings. The aftermath sent shockwaves and a clear unequivocal message to the government that could not be ignored, lest other parts of England went up in flames.


Key speaker Ayi-Kwei Sankofa (ABSS Chair) will deliver the 20th ABSS Memorial Lecture giving an eyewitness account of the Brixton Uprisings and lessons for us today. His focus will be the education of Black children and the role of Black parents/ guardians. The day will also have exhibitions, community stalls, food and drinks and displays of the children's activities including martial arts!

Thomas Sankara was one of Africa's most important antiimperialist leaders of the late 20th Century. His declaration that fundamental socio-political change would require a 'certain amount of madness' drove the Burkinabe Revolution and resurfaced in the country's popular uprising in 2014.

This book looks at Sankara's political philosophies and legacies

and their relevance today. His legacy is revealed by looking at contemporary activists, artists and politicians who draw inspiration from Sankarist thought in social movement struggles today, from South Africa to Burkina Faso.

Kennington walk: 'The Black man and his party': William Cuffay, Kennington and the Chartists Saturday 9 October, 2pm **Kennington Park** (meeting point outside Prince Consort Lodge)

William Cuffay was born in 1788, a man of African heritage, his father,

Chatham Cuffav. had previously been enslaved and was originally from St. Kitts. Cuffay, a tailor and political activist, was one of the main organisers of the large Chartist rally on Kennington Common on 10 April 1848. Months later Cuffay was arrested and convicted of preparing acts of treason, sentenced to 21 years penal transportation to

Tasmania where he spent the rest of his life. William Cuffay - 'The Black man and his party' as the press described him - wasn't the only important Black activist in the story of Kennington Common. Abolitionist, Robert Wedderburn, son of an enslaved West African woman, preached here on the site of what is now St Mark's Church.

What would you do if the people you trusted to uphold the law committed a crime against you? Who would you turn to? And how long would you fight them for? On 28th September 1985, Lee

Lawrence's mother Cherry Groce was shot by police during a raid on her Brixton home. The bullet shattered her spine and she never walked again. In the chaos that followed, 11-year-old Lee watched in horror as the News falsely pronounced his mother dead. In Brixton, already a powder keg because of the deep racism that the community was experiencing, it was the spark needed to trigger two days of rioting that saw

buildings brought down by petrol bombs, cars torched, and shops looted.

But for Lee, it was a spark that lit a flame that would burn for the next 30 years as he fought to get the police to recognise their wrongdoing. His life had changed forever. Join Lee to discuss his award-winning biography and the event that changed Brixton forever.


At fourteen, Adunni dreams of getting an education and giving

This book has already been lauded as a landmark work in international fiction. Join Celeste for a night in Trinidad via the lives of the Pleasantview people.






Hairvolution: Her Hair, Her Story, Our History Tuesday 19 October, 7pm Streatham Library, SW16 1PN





Coming Together, Growing Together – Black British Women in Theatre during the 80s and 90s featuring Munirah Theatre Company and writer Nicola Abram Saturday 30 October, 7pm Clapham Library. SW4 7DB

November 2020 saw the publication of Black British Women's Theatre – Intersectionality, Archives, Aesthetics written by Nicola Abram, lecturer in Literatures in English at University of Reading. Ms. Abram's ground-breaking exploration of the role, practices and creative responses of Black

female performance artists to the racism and sexism of Britain in the 1980s resulted in the publication of this award-winning book which documented, for the first time, the impact and reach of these women.

The book focuses on the work of three all-female theatre groups (Theatre of Black Women, Munirah Theatre Company and Black Mime Theatre Women's Troup) and two artists: Zindika and SuAndi. The evening will feature a showing of Polishing Black Diamonds (1988), a short documentary by Susannah Lopez which interweaves the choreopoetry of Munirah Theatre Company with the political and social thinking of group members

at the time. A presentation on Black British Women's Theatre by Nicola Abram will be followed by Still Coming Together, Still Growing Together – an interactive conversation sharing how the magic of Munirah has sustained a near 40 year SisStarhood, the current pursuits of Munirah members and their encouragement for the younger generation of Black people living in Britain. Get inspired, join the discussion and enjoy the evening of theatre and sounds.
