Traitor King with author Andrew Lownie







Both riotous and profound, this novel resurrects a vibrant era that deserves a place in our collective memory.



Young men and women from different Caribbean islands were quick to respond, paying the considerable sum of twenty-eight pounds ten shillings (£600 in today's money) to board the ship of dreams. This historical novel is the back story of the people, many in their teens, who had never before left their parents or island. The two-week voyage on the HMT Windrush saw parties, friendships, fights, racism, sex, and discussions of God and Love. Tony Fairweather was born in Clapham, the son of Jamaican parents. He opened one of the first Black

In West's novel, *Fall*, estranged brothers are reunited over plans to develop the tower block where they grew up, but the desolate estate becomes a stage for reliving the events of one life-changing summer, forty years earlier.

David's *There's Only One Danny Garvey*, was shortlisted for the bookshops in the UK, with an art gallery and artefacts. He then went on to work for the Voice newspaper heading up its book club. In 1989 he founded 'The Write Thing'. Tony is the founder and curator of the Windrush Collection and the Windrush Exhibition of artefacts associated with the Windrush generation. He lives in South London.

Windrush Playback Stories is an intergenerational storytelling project which aims to celebrate, commemorate and educate people about their lived experiences and their contribution to British society by using personal stories as source material. Life stories are volunteered by audience members and then enacted on the spot by the Windrush Playback Storytellers, accompanied by musicians.

Each story will be creative, memorable and fun with lots of improvisation where we playfully challenge the way in which Windrush can be celebrated, commemorated, taught and understood to ensure future generations understand its historical and contemporary significance.

been chosen as one of only 15 UK locations for StoryTrails, a unique immersive storytelling experience where untold stories from the past are brought to life through the magic https://story-trails.com/ of the 3D internet using augmented **Facebook and Instagram** and virtual reality to reanimate public spaces in towns and cities across **Twitter @StoryFuturesA** the UK. Audiences will time-travel via the wonder of new technologies to experience untold local histories where they happened. StoryTrails is one of 10 projects commissioned for UNBOXED, a UK-wide celebration of creativity in 2022 that will bring people together through free, large-scale immersive installations and globally accessible digital experiences in the UK's most ambitious showcase of creative

collaboration.

In September audiences will be guided through an immersive tour of Brixton as they explore stories across virtual and augmented reality (AR) and via a series of installations. Outside the library, participants will enter the virtual story portal to begin the StoryTrails experience guided by a free mobile AR app.

Professor David Olusoga, Executive Producer for StoryTrails, said: "I am thrilled to be working with StoryFutures to set the public's imagination alight with experiences that use the poetry of history to inspire a new vision of our future." StoryTrails will culminate with a specially commissioned film by David Olusoga on BBC iPlayer and elsewhere. Watch out for further updates as we edge closer.
