
We are lucky to have so many people from around the world who for centuries have made I ambeth their home. Black History Month is a time when

#### Celebrate National Poetry Day -**Poetry and Spoken Word Night**



#### Lena Horne: The M-G-M Years

To coincide with the publication of his latest book. Lena Horne: The M-G-M Years, film historian Stephen Bourne will present an engaging and informative talk about Lena Horne's association with MGM in the 1940s, and her breakthrough as Hollywood's first Black movie star. Stephen will include rare photos of the glamorous Lena in MGM productions including Cabin in the Sky (1943), Broadway Rhythm (1944), Till the Clouds Roll By (1946) and Words and Music (1948). Stephen will then answer questions on his book, and the evening ends with a screening of Cabin in the Sky.

#### Ten Amazing Black History Icons Who Achieved Greatness Despite The Slavery Era, with Robin Walker

Friday 6 October, 7pm Clapham Library, SW4 7DB

#### **Bookings**

Robin Walker 'The Black History Man' will address the brilliant careers of high achieving Black people during the least favourable era for them to have flourished: The Slave Trade. This inspirational

multi-media presentation covers Black influencers who excelled as mathematicians, engineers, soldiers, writers, intellectuals, artists and



composers. They left behind tangible legacies that we still admire today. The content begins with Juan Latino (sixteenth century) and ends with Mary Lewis (nineteenth century).

Robin Walker is one of the UK's most pre-eminent African scholars. He has been teaching and lecturing in African World Studies, Egyptology and Black History for nearly three decades. He is also a best-selling author with over sixteen books to his name, including the critically acclaimed work When We Ruled. He is a founder and keynote lecturer of 'The Black Secret Education Project', an online platform aimed at bringing a comprehensive knowledge of Black History and African Heritage to a global audience.

#### Kennington walk: 'The Black Man and His Party': William Cuffay, Kennington and the Chartists

Saturday 7 October, 11am

Kennington Park (meeting point outside Prince Consort Lodge Kennington Road/Kennington Park Road) SE11 4AS

William Cuffay was born in 1788, a man of African heritage. His father had previously been enslaved and was originally from St. Kitts. Cuffay, a tailor and political activist, was one of the main organisers of the large Chartist rally on Kennington Common on 10 April 1848. The Chartists were a mass movement petitioning the government for democratic reform. Months later Cuffay was arrested and convicted of treason, sentenced to 21 years penal transportation to Van Diemen's Land (Tasmania) where he spent the rest of his life.

William Cuffay – wasn't the only important Black activist in the story of Kennington Common. Abolitionist, Robert Wedderburn, preached here on the site of what is now St Mark's Church.

Join the Friends of Kennington Park to walk in the footsteps of Black British radical leaders like Cuffay and Wedderburn.



## Sufferah, with award winning writer Alex Wheatle

In this breathtaking memoir, acclaimed writer Alex Wheatle shows how music became his salvation through a childhood marred by abuse.

Abandoned as a baby to the British care system, Alex grows up with no knowledge of his Jamaican parentage or family history. Later, he is inexorably drawn to reggae, which



becomes his lifeline through disrupted teenage years, the challenges of living as a young Black man in 1980s Britain and his imprisonment for protesting against systemic racism and police brutality.

Alex's youth was portrayed in Oscar Award winning director Steve McQueen's *Small Axe* series.


In Sufferah, he tells his own story, urgently, vividly and unsentimentally. His award-winning fiction - and this memoir - are a call to never give up hope. They remind us that words can be our sustenance, and music our heartbeat.

#### War to Windrush - Black Women in Britain 1939 to 1948, an illustrated talk by Stephen Bourne

Commemorating the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the Empire Windrush, Stephen Bourne's *War to Windrush* explores the lives of Britain's immigrant community through the experiences of Black British women during the period spanning from the beginning of World War II to the arrival of the Empire Windrush in 1948.



In those short years, Black British women performed an integral role in keeping the country functioning and set the stage for the arrival of other Black Britons on the

Empire Windrush. The book shows first-hand what life was like in Britain for Black women through photography and evocative prose.

War to Windrush is a celebration of multiculturalism and immigration, much needed in today's political climate.

#### **Black Girl from Pyongyang with Brixton Radical Readers**

Join Brixton Library's Radical Readers to discuss the extraordinary true story of a West African girl's upbringing in North Korea under the protection of President Kim II Sung.

In 1979. Monica Macias, aged only seven, was transplanted from West Africa to the unfamiliar surroundings of North Korea. She was sent by her father Francisco.

the first president of post-Independence Equatorial Guinea, to be educated under the quardianship of his ally, Kim II Sung. Within months, her father was executed in a military coup; her mother became unreachable. Effectively orphaned, she and two siblings had to make their life in Pyongyang. At military boarding school. Monica learned to mix with older children, speak fluent Korean and handle weapons on training exercises.

After university, she went in search of her roots, passing through Beijing, Seoul, Madrid, Guinea, New York and finally London – forced at every step to reckon with damning perceptions of her adoptive homeland. Optimistic yet unflinching, Monica's astonishing and unique story challenges us to see the world through different eyes.

of the Oxford Research Centre in the Humanities. Farah has published multiple academic studies of Shakespeare and is a General Editor for Arden's Shakespeare in the Theatre series.

Combining piercing analysis of race, gender and otherness in plays from Othello to The Tempest, with a radical reappraisal of Elizabethan London, The Great White Bard entreats us neither to idealise nor to fossilise Shakespeare but instead to look him in the eye and reckon with the discomforts of his plays, playhouses and society, and in doing so maybe even fall in love with him all over again.

Years later, when Rose falls pregnant to another man, his heart is shattered. As the Burma Campaign mounts, and Obi is shipped out to fight, he is haunted by the mystery of Rose's

lover. When his identity comes to light, Obi's devastation leads to a tragic chain of unexpected events.

Rosanna Amaka is the author of *The Book of Echoes* and *Rose and the Burma Sky*. Louise Hare's latest book is the fantastic *Harlem After Midnight*.

#### Ama: An African Journey of Discovery, Film Screening



## Soul Survivor: Soul Legend PP Arnold in conversation with music journalist Lloyd Bradley

Join soul legend P.P. Arnold, in conversation with journalist and writer Lloyd Bradley, to discuss her extraordinary memoir – *Soul Survivor*.

From her origins in powerhouse church gospel, Arnold's performing career began at the age of just seventeen when she joined the lke & Tina Turner Revue. But little did the young lkette know that her world was about to be turned upside-down...

Upon arriving in London in 1966 to support the Rolling Stones, the shy but vivacious teenager caught the eye of frontman Mick Jagger. He would persuade her to stay in the city and record as a solo artist, ultimately leading to a five-decade career working with everyone from Rod Stewart, Eric Clapton, the Small Faces, Nick Drake and Barry Gibb to Peter Gabriel, Roger Waters, the KLF, Paul Weller and Primal Scream.

Although it has been far from a gilded life for the soul superstar, she survived it all. Now P.P. Arnold shares her remarkable adventures in her long-awaited memoir.



Lloyd Bradley is one of the UK's foremost Black

music experts and a seasoned cultural commentator both in print and in person. He is the author of many books and was Associate Producer of BBC2's award winning series *Reggae: The Story of Jamaican Music* and among the UK's first Black pirate radio crew on the iconic Dread Broadcast Corporation. With a background of over 30 years as a music journalist he has written for *Mojo, Blues & Soul, the Independent, the Observer, Q Magazine, Esquire, Smash Hits. Music Week and the NME.*

groundbreaking book, The Culture Trap: Ethnic Expectations and Unequal Schooling for Black Youth.

Derron challenges the notion that culture alone can explain the academic performance and behaviour of Black students in schools, emphasising the complex factors at play. He focuses on the experiences of Black Caribbeans in London and New York, revealing how culture is often used as an excuse for racism in educational settings and offering strategies for dismantling these discriminatory practices.

Dr Derron Wallace was the Jacob S. Potofsky Chair in Sociology and is Associate Professor of Sociology and Education at Brandeis University, USA. He is also a research fellow at the University of Manchester.

Whether you are an educator, a student, a parent, or a community member concerned about the educational experiences of Black youth, this author talk is not to be missed.

Both families must sit down face to face and examine each other's level of intolerance. Director Stanley Kramer creates a masterful study of society's prejudices.

#### Speak Out! Book Launch with the Brixton Black Women's Group



Speak Out! brings together the writings of the Brixton Black Women's Group (BWG) for the first time in a landmark collection.

Established in 1973, in response to the lack of interest in women's issues experienced in male-dominated Black organisations, the Brixton Black Women's Group's aim was to create a distinct space where women of African and Asian descent could meet to focus on political, social and cultural issues as they affected Black women. BWG published its own newsletter, *Speak Out*, which kept alive the debate about the relevance of feminism to Black

politics and provided a Black women's perspective on immigration, housing, health and culture.

The Brixton Black Women's Group was one of the first Black women's groups to be established in Britain. Many Black women came to Britain in the '50s and '60s, either by invitation from the British government to help staff the National Health Service and London Transport, or forced by the ravages of colonialism. It is against this background that the Brixton Black Women's Group was born and fought for the liberation of women and Black people world-wide.

#### Directors in Conversation: Imruh Bakari talks to Kwesi Owusu director of Ama

Following the film showing of *Ama* at West Norwood Picturehouse earlier in the festival, Director Kwesi Owusu will discuss the film and his work with fellow Director Imruh Bakari.

Kwesi Owusu is one of Ghana's leading filmmakers and writer. He is also the author of five books. In the 1980s, he was a founding member of the influential pan-African performance group African Dawn. Since 2022 he has hosted the African Dawn podcast, covering "untold stories" from Africa's cultural history, as well as current trends in the arts world.

**Imruh Bakari** was the Festival Director of the Zanzibar International Film Festival (ZIFF) for 5 years and is a founder/director of Tanzania Screenwriters Forum. He is a former member of the Advisory Council of the Pan-African





Federation of Filmmakers and currently a member of Tanzania Independent Producers Association, and the Editorial Board of the Journal of African Cinemas. He has a number of film and television credits, including *Riots and Rumours of Riots, Street Warriors and The Mark of the Hand*. In 2013 he received a Lifetime Achievement Award for his work in African Cinema.

## None of the Above – Lambeth LGBTQ+ book group special

Winner of the Jhalak prize 2023, Travis Alabanza examines seven phrases people have directed at them about their gender identity. These phrases have stayed with them over the years. Some are deceptively

innocuous, some deliberately loaded or offensive, some celebratory; sentences that have impacted them for better and for worse; sentences that speak to the broader issues



raised by a world that insists that gender must be a binary.

Through these seven phrases, which include some of their most transformative experiences as a Black, mixed race, non-binary person, Travis Alabanza turns a mirror back on society, giving us reason to question the very framework in which we live and the ways we treat each other.

## Book launch by Prof. Gus John in conversation with Prof. Lez Henry

Join Prof. Gus John in launching his two new books *Blazing Trails - stories of a Heroic Generation* and *Don't Salvage the Empire Windrush*. Gus will be in conversation with Prof. Lez Henry.

In Blazing Trails, Professor Gus John pays tribute to a truly heroic generation: twenty-two individuals whose lives were dedicated to the struggle for racial equality and social justice in post-war Britain. Like the Sankofa bird, their stories enable this generation to learn from our past as they seek to make sense of the present and build a more equitable future.

In Don't Salvage the Empire Windrush, he seeks to challenge the everencroaching Windrush narrative, which the state has adopted and is zealously promoting. He debunks the notion that the arrival of the Empire Windrush in 1948 marked the beginning of the evolution and growth of multiracial Britain. It is a narrative that displaces the history of those settled Black communities who had struggled against racism and marginalisation in Britain prior to its arrival, and those who fought for national independence of the Black Commonwealth while building a global Pan-Africanist movement right here in Britain.






Professor Gus John is an academic and an equality and human rights campaigner. He is an education campaigner, author and was the first Black Director of Education in Britain in 1989. Since the 1960s, he has spent his entire career campaigning against racial discrimination and issues within the education sector in Britain's inner cities. 2020 saw Gus voted as one of the '100 Great Black Britons'.

#### Prof William 'Lez' **Henry** is an academic, a writer, poet and community activist who has lectured nationally and internationally, featuring in numerous documentaries, current affairs television and radio programmes. He is also the British Reggae dancehall deejay Lezlee Lyrix. He lectures in the areas of criminology, sociology, anthropology, Black history, race, education, ethnicity, youth crime and cultural studies.
