THE QUEEN VISITS GAIA CENTRE

Her Majesty The Queen visited the Gaia Centre, which provides confidential, non-judgmental and independent support services for local people who are experiencing gender-based violence.



The Queen met with survivors of domestic abuse, alongside frontline staff and Lambeth Council representatives Cllr Dr Mahamed Hashi and Cllr Rezina Chowdhury to hear about the work to end genderbased violence in the borough. Her Majesty The Queen said:

"I particularly salute all the survivors who are able to get out there; to talk to me, talk to everybody and tell other people about what they've been through, because they are going to save many lives by getting others to come forward."

The Gaia Centre is commissioned by Lambeth Council and run by the charity Refuge to offer a onestop shop supporting survivors with outreach programmes and independent advocacy. It is accessible to anyone living in Lambeth who has experienced or is at risk of gender-based violence.

Black Prince Trust launches North Lambeth Community Living Room

Lambeth Council and Black Prince Trust (BPT) have launched the North Lambeth Community Living Room (CLR) and BPT's new Social and Wellbeing space 'The Lounge'.

The Community Living Room at The Black Prince Trust Community Hub is a partnership funded by Lambeth Together. It builds on work undertaken by the Thriving North Lambeth network.

Lambeth's first two Community Parklets

Lambeth Council's Big Shift has ioined forces with Meristem to deliver the first Community Parklets designed by residents.

The first two parklets were installed in January with more planned for the coming months. Lambeth's Community Parklets Scheme, supported by the Big Shift Community Fund, invites residents in the borough to design their own public space. As part of the Kerbside Strategy, the parklets project is helping reallocate

kerbside space away from just being parking spaces and towards greener and more community focused uses. The parklets that have been installed include planters for community growing and benches for anyone to rest and socialise. If you are interested in a parklet for your street, it's not too late! Crackdown on fly-tipping

Lambeth Council is stepping up patrols in the borough's five town centres to crack down on fly-tipping which is both an envirocrime that blights communities and a waste of public money to address. Illegally dumped commercial and household waste will be investigated by the team before it is cleared away, and where possible, fines will be issued to those responsible. Cllr Rezina Chowdhurv. deputy leader and Cabinet Member for Sustainable Lambeth and Clean Air, said: "We know the majority of our residents and businesses act responsibly and dispose of their waste the right way. But those that either can't be bothered or are looking for shortcuts will be held to account for their anti-social behaviour."

Expansion to Electric Vehicle charging

Lambeth Council has announced a £2million investment in expanding the number of charging points for electric vehicles across the borough. This investment will see an additional 167 lamppost charge points for additional 167 lamppost charge points for residents across the borough. 44 fast chargers on estates and a minimum of 10 rapid chargers.

CLIMATE ACTION





In 2024, Lambeth Council will be installing over £6 million of sustainable drainage systems (SuDS) to help reduce surface water flood risk across the borough.

SuDS are features that use natural and engineered material to manage rainwater from roofs and roads. They are often planted and come in many shapes and sizes to fit and blend into their surroundings. Raingardens, a great example of SuDS, are lowered areas of land that are heavily planted that collect rainwater from their surroundings.

This £6 million 'Soak Up Lambeth' programme is being delivered in partnership with Thames Water Utilities, Greater London Authority, and the Department for Education. It is the largest single SuDS initiative in London.

This investment is vital for

Lambeth, particularly as flood events continue to worsen due to climate change. This is because most of the ground in Lambeth is made of clay, which is not good at absorbing water. This, combined with lots of hard surfaces like road, pavements, and car parks, means our drains quickly get overwhelmed during storms, causing localised flooding in lowlying areas of the borough.

The SuDS will help minimise flooding and pollution by collecting, filtering, and storing rainwater before being slowly released into our sewers. This gives the low-lying areas a chance to drain. The type of SuDS Soak





Up Lambeth will be installing will be planted and will provide new and improved green spaces for nature and to improve the look and feel of the area.

The digital phone switchover

What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2025 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology.

This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones and healthcare devices will be switched over.

How will it affect me/what do I need to do?

The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to full fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider such as Virgin Media O2 or BT should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure your service isn't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect.

If you have an internet connection, the change may be as simple as plugging your phone into your broadband router rather than the socket on the wall.

If you're worried about your devices, please contact the supplier, provider or company who provide them. They will be able to give you more information.

Do you or someone you know depend on their landline and/or use a telecare device connected to a phone line such as a fall monitor, lifeline or personal alarm?

If yes, then please notify the communications provider now (the provider of this service) so that they can advise on how the switch might affect the service of the devices or home phone.

If you have other devices connected to your phone line, such as alarm systems, your alarm service provider might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible. If you are unsure about how a device in your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will still work on a digital phone line.

In an emergency

Digital landlines cannot carry a power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Preserving our shared history

Lambeth Archives re-opened on February 12, at 16 Brixton Hill after spending 133 years at the Minet Library in Knatchbull Road.

Lambeth's important collection is now installed at a new, custombuilt strongroom which features more than two miles of shelving – more than the distance between the Archives' old and new homes.

Cllr Donatus Anyanwu,
Cabinet Member for Stronger
Communities, Leisure and
Sports, said: "We are delighted
to have this new location up and
running so we can offer a much
better service to our residents
and best preserve the history of
our much loved borough. The
Archives is now based in the
heart of Brixton's growing cultural

and knowledge hub alongside the Black Cultural Archives, the Brixton House theatre, the Ritzy Cinema, and Brixton library, which is being refurbished this year."

On the outside of the building, a local graphic artist has worked with the archivists to use images from the collections to illustrate a timeline of Lambeth's past, going from woolly mammoths up to recent events.

Lambeth's Archives collection documents 1,000 years of local history and holds 500 years of records of Lambeth as a local authority, including collections of national significance and a rich local studies collection. The new building has a gallery, named after Olive Morris. It will exhibit

The council-run Lambeth Archives which holds a rich historic collection of documents, books, maps and photographs about the borough and its people has relocated to a new, purpose-built location in Brixton.

the Archives' treasures plus host visiting exhibitions and can be hired for meetings.


The Archives are part of a new development that has replaced Olive Morris House which used to be council offices. The building was demolished when the council went from 14 to 2 office buildings, to save money and provide more homes for the people of the borough. The Lambeth Archives are on the ground floor beneath 74 new homes – 30 of which are affordable.

The council is now looking at improving the Minet Library to meet the needs of the local community.



"Inadequate" Government funding puts council services at risk

Services in Lambeth will have to make further savings over the next few years, because the Government's funding deal fell far short of the fair settlement demanded by councils across the country.

Senior councillors have warned that the national financial settlement announced in December will only add to the financial restraints imposed on the borough during more than a decade of austerity.

The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities said its funding package amounted to a 6.5% increase in funding for councils in England. But this figure assumes councils will raise council tax bills to the maximum allowable levels.

A report to a Lambeth Cabinet meeting this month (February) has now revealed the scale of financial pressures facing the council, due to the increased costs of providing temporary accommodation for more homeless families and social care placements for vulnerable children. These intensifying pressures mean the council has



to find over £19m of savings next year.

It also warns that in light of the government package, along with the impact of a stuttering economy, Lambeth will need to find an additional £8.7m of savings over the next four years, in addition to the £32m already identified – unless the Government heeds demands for more support for local councils.

Cllr David Amos, Cabinet
Member for Finance and Cost of
Living, said: "The simple fact is
that, after more than a decade
of austerity, unprecedented cuts
in our funding from government,
and record levels of inflation,
what the Government is
promising us is nowhere near
enough.

"Our services are under significant financial pressure – there are more people requiring



temporary accommodation, more children and adults needing the support of social care and the cost of delivering services has rocketed due to inflation. The failure to fund local government properly means councils up and down the country are being forced to make even more savings and propose rises in council tax to balance their budgets.

"Due to strong financial management in recent years, we are able to set a balanced budget for next year while protecting vital frontline services. But unless the government wakes up to the reality we are all facing, increasingly difficult decisions will have to be made about services in the future."

The council's budget proposals, set out in the report to cabinet, will be decided at a Full Council meeting at the end of February, when councillors will receive an update on the government funding situation and financial pressures.

The budget proposals include a number of areas where financial savings will be made, including increasing income from fees and parking permits. The budget proposals also set out areas of continued investment in supporting residents through the cost of living crisis with a programme of support for those in financial crisis, and more children from low income families receiving free school meals.

The Revenue and Capital Budget 2024/25 to 2028/29 report said: "Despite the increasingly challenging situation we and other councils find ourselves in as a result of stubbornly high inflation and increasing demands on essential services, government funding has fallen far short of what Lambeth and councils up and down the country have been calling for from central government."

In spite of the increasing restrictions, the report makes clear that the council is presenting a balanced budget for 2024/25 and doing all it can to protect front line services.

The report highlights the Council Tax Support (CTS) scheme, one of the most generous in London, which will reduce the Council Tax bills of over 16.000 households to nil. Council Tax rates for residents not in receipt of Council Tax Support are recommended to increase by 2.99%, with an extra 2% to pay for additional investment in social care for older people and people with disabilities.

The government announced in January that councils would now receive a £600 million support package, in addition to funding outlined at the provisional settlement, "to help them deliver key services". However, the cross-party group London Councils warned that this would still leave London boroughs hundreds of millions of pounds short of the amount they'll need to provide services next year.

Lambeth Council leader Cllr Claire Holland, who is deputy chair of London Councils, said: "It is welcome that Government has listened to the sector and acknowledges the serious financial pressures putting immense strain on local services. However, even with the extra funding, London boroughs face a funding gap of over £400m next year."

Cllr Holland said the Government's settlement failed to acknowledge the huge overspends on key services London boroughs were facing this year - including an expected £150 million on providing housing to those in need, and a forecast £350 million on adult and children's social care.

She added: "Councils in London will carry on meeting our responsibility to provide services to all our residents particularly the most vulnerable in our city. But for too long, while the population and the demand for council services has been growing fast, London boroughs have been left to meet that demand with inadequate funding."

Young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) took centre stage at the "Lambeth SEND Have Your Say" event where their views started creating a roadmap for future SEND services.

This interactive afternoon, co-designed and delivered by Lambeth Council and local community organisation Socialising Angels, invited 14 to 25 year olds, their families and carers, to come together to:

- Talk, not just listen: Young people shared their experiences with school, jobs, hobbies, and more.
- Dream big: From living alone to managing money to fun activities, everyone talked about what services they want.
- Shape the future: This feedback will help design programs and support that meets young people's needs and goals.

What they said:

- School and work: Special programs and being included are important - school and hands-on learning help build confidence and independence.
- Living on your own: Learning things like using the bus, eating healthily and managing money is key.
- Making friends: Having clubs, activities and hanging out with others helps everyone feel good.
- Staying healthy: Having doctors and specialists who understand special needs is important.

What's next:

- More training in key skills like living alone, money management, and online shopping.
- Inclusive social programs, diverse activities, and chances to get involved in the community.
- Travel training, support for new ways of getting around, and addressing safety concerns.
- Keeping the conversation going - our brand new SEND Youth Involvement Coordinator will be building our SEND Youth Forum to keep everyone talking and listening



Get checked and take charge of your health

Whether it's for our own peace of mind, to help us feel more in control of our health, or for our loved ones, we know it's important to stay on top of health checks, screenings and tests. But with so much on our plates, it's also easy for important actions concerning our health to slip. Good health underpins everything about our lives, so this spring, let's prioritise that essential check-up.

The NHS is encouraging people from Black communities especially to come forward for cancer screening and diagnostic tests. This is because 1 in 4 Black men in England will get prostate cancer, with 1 in 12 dying from the disease. And because Black women are twice as likely as white British women to get diagnosed with breast cancer when it is at a later stage and harder to treat. This needs to change.

Survival from cancer increases significantly with early diagnosis. Get checked, take charge of your health and your future.

Health and care organisations in Lambeth are working together to make sure that people receive early diagnosis and support for cancer and other health conditions.

Female and aged between 50 and 70? Attend your breast screening when invited

All women between the ages of 50 and 70 will receive a letter every three years inviting them for their NHS breast cancer screening. Alongside regularly self-examining your breasts, this routine screening helps to identify signs of breast cancer, so attending could save your life.

It's a shocking fact that Black women are twice as likely to get a late diagnosis of breast cancer. Let's turn this around, starting with going for your breast screening appointment when you get your invite from the NHS. Women are often the glue holding families together - busy seeing to

everyone's else's needs. Screening is a simple act of self-care, so do it for yourself and for your loved ones. Black, male and over 45? Ask your GP about a PSA test

Black men have a 1 in 4 chance of getting prostate cancer, compared with a risk of 1 in 8 for white men. There is a lot of work being done globally to understand and tackle these differences.

If you're Black, male and over 45, please contact your GP practice and ask about getting a PSA blood test. This simple test measures

the amount of prostate specific antigen (PSA) in your blood. PSA is a protein produced by normal cells in the prostate and also by prostate cancer cells. A raised PSA level may suggest you have a problem with your prostate, but not necessarily cancer.

Based on your results, your GP will advise you on next steps, including when you'll need to book another PSA blood test.

MEASLES IS IN THE NEWS AGAIN


Measles outbreaks have been reported across the country, including cases in London, impacting children, teenagers, young people and unvaccinated/under-vaccinated communities. Measles is more than just a rash, and can lead to serious complications for some children. It is highly infectious and can spread rapidly among communities. such as schools, if people have not had at least one dose of the MMR vaccine. Two doses of the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine give the best protection. The 1st dose is offered at 12 months, and the 2nd dose is offered from 18 months. The good news is – it's never too late! Please get in touch with your GP who can arrange to get your child up to date, or alternatively, scan the QR code to find a community catch-up clinic.





Be the difference.

Every day in Lambeth a new child comes into our care, and we urgently need more foster carers to give them the love and support they deserve. Fostering means looking after someone else's child because their birth family are unable to. That can vary from short-term foster care to having a child or young people with you for a long time.



As a foster carer, you'll look after children as if they were your own – in a loving home environment. You'll need to be sensitive to the challenges they'll face after separation from their families and any additional trauma they may have been through, such as abuse or neglect.

Fostering for your local council helps the young person and helps

our community. There are many different types of foster care, and we're sure there's one that works for you. For example, you could provide short-term respite care to children with disabilities to allow their parents a break. Or, if you have the space, you could help us keep a family together by caring for siblings. If you work 9 to 5, you may find it easier to

foster older children who are more independent.

After a while, some carers specialise in areas of care: Joan cares for young people on remand from prison, helping them get their lives back on track. Solomon looks after unaccompanied children seeking asylum from war-torn countries.

When you foster for Lambeth, you get:

- 24/7 out-of-hours support from a dedicated social worker and our team, 365 days per year
- two weeks paid respite each year (14 days)
- a £500 referral bonus if you refer a friend who becomes an approved, active foster carer for Lambeth
- a rebate of your council tax if you are actively fostering for us
- among the most competitive fees and allowances in London
- Fostering Network membership and the opportunity to join our active fostering support group
- priority (before a private fostering agency) when a child is looking for a placement

- a thorough induction programme
- your own dedicated supervising social worker (SSW)
- ongoing training and development opportunities throughout the year
- peer mentorship to newly approved carers run by our most experienced foster carers.



Being a foster carer isn't always easy, but our team will help every step of the way. You can also choose to meet regularly with our foster carer support group helping each other improve the way we work. The journey to becoming a foster carer for Lambeth takes around six months. Although this may seem a long time, most

people tell us the process allows them to think more closely and prepare themselves for making the commitment.


