


Lambeth Libraries Black History Month 2024

Courtney Laws OD, OBE (1931 – 1996) spent four decades of his life uplifting the Black community from the thriving cornerstone of black culture – Brixton.

A significant pioneer of the Windrush Generation he helped thousands of people adjust to life in Britain from as early as the 1950s as he sought to support, empower, inspire and represent them, utilizing a phenomenal skill set developed through his political aspirations as a teenager in

Jamaica and yet his contribution to black British history has remained untold until now!



My Dad Mr Brixton

is a 9-part podcast series written and produced by his daughter Claudette Parry Laws and the result of a decade long pursuit to put his story on the public record. Her investigation brings to life a curious case of a missing legacy, offering a different perspective on modern Black British history and raises questions no daughter should have to ask.

Jon Newman of Lambeth Archives talks about historic Shakespeare performances in Lambeth with a particular focus on the various performances of Othello starring Black actors.


Brixton Radical Readers discuss Think Like a White Man... While Black!


Encounters with James Baldwin: Celebrating 100 years

You couldn't find two artistic mediums more different than those used by the Black British artist Marcia Bennett-Male. For around three decades she has made her living as a stone carver and letter cutter, while intermittently expressing a very different aspect of her personality through her textile pieces.

Her carvings revolve around the universal topic of food and tend to be subtle and meditative, expressing the pleasure she derives from the shapes and forms of organic food produce, looking especially at produce from the African diaspora.

Her bright, bold and deceptively simple textile pieces tackle a myriad of subjects, from forgotten Black women of history to her own mental health issues, and how she fits into the dominant culture.

Sir Frank Bowling, OBE RA: Selected Prints

Brixton Library is extremely proud to announce an exhibition of sixteen special edition prints by Sir Frank Bowling, OBE RA, one of Britain's foremost contemporary abstract artists, best known for his abstract paintings which can be seen in museum collections all over the world.

Sir Frank Bowling and DACS – the Design and Artists Copyright Society – began their collaboration with art publishers King & McGaw in 2021. The result is a collection of sixteen giclée prints of Bowling's masterful paintings ranging from 1968 to 2020. Handmade in Sussex, the prints are produced in limited runs on 330gsm Somerset Velvet Cotton. The collection includes Bowling's 'map paintings' that trace and layer stencils of countries and continents, and 'pour paintings' where acrylic paint is poured directly onto the canvas.

The group of 16 prints includes *Middle Passage*, 1970, a rich, warm and vibrant work recently exhibited in the major group show *Entangled Pasts: Art, Colonialism and Change* at the Royal Academy of Arts, London.

Capoeira Workshop




Baller Boys with Venessa Taylor




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
