The **2025** festival is here with another month-long programme of inspirational literary events. We hope you find something to enjoy.



As part of the celebrations of the return of the Lambeth Shakespeare Folios. we are delighted to be hosting Shakespearean actor/ director Adjoa Andoh.

Adjoa will be giving a selection of her favourite readings from Shakespeare's plays using our earliest folio dating from 1632.

Adjoa is maybe best known for her role as Lady Danbury in the Netflix Regency romance series Bridgerton but her connections to Shakespeare have been lifelong, playing lead roles with the Royal Shakespeare Company and conceiving, co-directing and starring in the first all women of colour Shakespeare production on a UK stage with her critically acclaimed Richard II at the Globe Theatre followed by her groundbreaking Richard III at Liverpool Playhouse and



The Rose Theatre. Adjoa is an Honorary Fellow of the British Shakespeare Association, an honorary fellow of the Shakespeare Association of America, an Emeritus Fellow of St. Catherine's College, Oxford and an honorary fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.

Why had her shadowy other gone down such an extreme path? Why was identity - all we have to meet the world - so unstable?

In November 2021, an inflatable dinghy carrying migrants from France to the UK capsized in the Channel causing the death of 27 people on board. Despite receiving numerous calls for help, the French authorities wrongly

told the migrants they were in British waters and had to call the British authorities for help. By the time rescue vessels arrived on the scene, all but two of the migrants had died



The narrator of Delecroix's fictional account of the events is the woman who took the calls. Accused of failing in her duty, she refuses to be held more responsible than others for this disaster. Why should she be more responsible than the sea, than the war, than the crises behind these tragedies?

A shocking, moral tale of our times. Small Boat reminds us of the power of fiction to illuminate our darkest crimes.





It is a history that is not widely known and understood, and that invisibility has created a space where fear and hostility continue to thrive.

The Roma is a powerful corrective to the stereotyping and prejudices still faced by Romani communities, a celebration of survival - of resilience and resistance in the face of prejudice and persecution. Madeline Potter was born in Romania in 1989 and grew up Romani in nineties post-Communist Romania. She now lives in Scotland and is a scholar of nineteenth-century



literature at the University of Edinburgh.




My Dear Kabul: A Year in the Life of an Afghan Women's **Writing Group**

In August 2021, as the Taliban approached the gates of Kabul, twentyone women writers in Afghanistan messaged their WhatsApp group chat: they asked what news others had heard and if everyone was safe.

These women had been brought together as a writing group and were about to publish their first collection of short stories. Some were students, some newly married, one was a grandmother;



all were afraid of what was now to come. Over the next year, in their makeshift online refuge, they shared the day-to-day reality of life after the Taliban retook Afghanistan. This is their collective diary, forming a powerful chorus of resistance and solidarity.


One morning, while shaving, the comedian Mark Steel noticed that one side of his neck seemed larger than the other. After a whistlestop tour of assorted



A transformative love story about two best friends who fall for each other, fall apart, and try to find their way back together in their tight-knit British-Jamaican community.
