A Healthy Neighbourhood for Kennington

Lambeth Council is planning to trial a new Healthy Neighbourhood in the Kennington Triangle area to reduce road danger, improve air quality, and make the area more pleasant for residents and workers.

The scheme will cover the area containing the Imperial War Museum and The Cinema Museum, bounded by Kennington Lane, Kennington Road, Lambeth Road, A3, and A3021.

The council will engage with residents, businesses, and other stakeholders over the next month to gather feedback and produce initial proposals. A trial is expected to be launched later this year to monitor

traffic data and gather community feedback before evaluating the scheme's success.

Deputy leader Cllr Rezina Chowdhury emphasized the importance of community input, stating that the scheme will be tailored to the needs of the community. The Healthy Neighbourhood aims to make the area safer for walking, cycling, scooting, and wheeling by reducing vehicle through-traffic and speeds. It is part of Lambeth's Healthy Streets programme, which uses interventions and public space improvements to create safer, cleaner, and greener neighbourhoods.

Community Parklets

We invite residents to be community parklet keepers to create pleasant, sustainable neighbourhoods.

The Community Parklet Scheme is open for applications to transform kerbside parking areas into social spaces, green areas, and places to stop and rest. Deputy leader Cllr Rezina Chowdhury, cabinet member for Sustainable Lambeth and Clean Air, said: "Neighbourhoods are being transformed. Streets with parked cars now have spaces for community gardens or safe play areas for children."

External review hails council's commitment to equity and justice

An independent review team has praised Lambeth Council's performance in a series of key areas.

A Local Government Association (LGA) 'peer challenge' found the council had strong political and organisational leadership - and a clear focus on achieving equity and justice, which "shines through" Lambeth's ambitious masterplan for the borough. The LGA team also reported that Lambeth was making sustained progress on improving performance in key public services such as Housing and Children's Services.



10 years of Poetic Unity

Living Wage employer Poetic Unity celebrate 10 years of helping young people in Lambeth and beyond find their own voices, joy - and fair pay.

Poetic Unity is an accredited Living Wage employer originating in Lambeth and still based in Brixton 10 years later. Their mission to empower young people, help them find their own voices, and find careers that bring them joy reflects founder Ryan Matthews-Robinson's own life iournev.

He began by making music with his musician grandfather

to raise funds for Alzheimer's Research after his grandmother was diagnosed with the disease. He spoke at schools and colleges and developed links with Lambeth's voluntary sector to connect with young people.

Mr Matthews-Robinson said: "Then I saw George the Poet. I saw him as someone like me - a working-class Londoner, I never thought of myself as a poet until somebody told me that something I'd written was a dope poem.

"Having found my voice through spoken word, I wanted to help other young people find and use theirs."

New Brixton Hub offers women better contraception choices

The new Long-Acting **Reversible Contraception** Services (LARC) Hub at 1a Raleigh Gardens on Brixton Hill offers the improvements to healthcare that the women of Lambeth asked for during a 2023 survey.

The new hub offers a range of long-term contraceptive methods including coil fittings and implants that reduce the chance of pregnancy.

The Hub will provide training opportunities for local clinicians interested in becoming LARC fitters and appointments for patients whose GP does not offer LARC services.

Cllr Jacqui Dver, Lambeth's Cabinet Member for Healthier Communities, said: "Since 2023 we have been working to improve the contraception offer across Lambeth. Including increasing appointments available at the weekends.

"We have also made coil appointments available for HRT treatment and for noncontraceptive reasons at the GP. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the GP Federation for its partnership work on improving access to contraception."



Pedalling for change

The inspirational story of Cycle Sisters



Lambeth Council has supported a Muslim women's cycling group who are developing their bike skills and boosting their confidence.

Cycle Sisters is a volunteer-run organisation that organises free weekly cycle sessions to create a supportive and inclusive womenonly space to gain more confidence on a bicycle.

The group was formed in 2016 and now has more than 150 members in Lambeth and has expanded across London, with more than 1,500 women within their wider network.

The group has been vital in helping Muslim women to gain confidence on a bicycle as well as confronting stereotypes and promoting health and wellbeing. It has helped countless women develop from beginners to experienced cyclists by

providing support and skill training.

However, they have been subjected to "racist and Islamophobic" abuse while on rides.

Cycle Sisters organiser Sarah Javaid said: "Men make three times as many journeys as women. We want to try and address this, help make cycling more open, more welcoming for more people, so everyone can have the opportunity to benefit from cycling.

"Most of the time we are out on our bikes we get a really positive response from people but unfortunately on occasions we have experienced some harassment that is sometimes racist or Islamophobic, which can be guite hard to deal with."

Lambeth Council and Brompton Bike Hire have been supporting the group for its weekly rides by providing free bikes to ensure as many women as possible can join in.

Businesses back

There are more OurBikes in Lamper than ever - find out why people are making the switch There are more OurBikes in Lambeth

Lambeth's Big Shift programme has teamed up with Peddle My Wheels to introduce four additional OurBikes this spring, making it even easier for residents to travel around the borough in a healthier, more sustainable way.

OurBike is a community cargo bike share scheme, that offers an alternative to cars or vans. Residents and local businesses can hire electric cargo bikes through the OurBike app for mid-range journeys such as shopping trips, taking their kids to the park, or making deliveries to nearby customers.

For new users who don't have much experience with cargo bikes, Peddle My Wheels offers free training that can be tailored to the routes they plan to use.

Deputy leader Cllr Rezina Chowdhury, cabinet member for Sustainable Lambeth and Clean Air. said: "Since Our Bike launched in Lambeth, we have seen more residents and businesses use the bikes to transport goods and move around the borough without needing a motor vehicle.

"We are now adding six additional Our Bikes for even more people to use. It contributes a huge amount vehicle emissions, cut

make transport in Lambeth far more active while continuing to support local businesses.

"We are clear in our commitment to reduce overall vehicle journeys in Lambeth, and we are supporting our residents and businesses to make the transition to more active forms of travel a bit easier and that work for everyone."







Meet the Cabinet

Deputy leader Cllr Rezina Chowdhury, Cabinet Member for Sustainable Lambeth and Clean Air, discusses Lambeth Council's plans to make neighbourhoods more pleasant, more equal and more sustainable so they meet the needs of the future.

What has Lambeth Council done so far?

RC: Lambeth Council was the first London borough to declare a Climate Emergency in 2019, which we followed with a citizens assembly that brought together people from across Lambeth to guide us with expert help on a fair pathway to Net Zero 2030. Since then, we have taken a leading role in responding to the climate crisis on a local level. That has meant taking transformative decisions on climate and transport that other local authorities have followed.

How has the council done that?

RC: We have a series of ambitious strategies that set out our aims. The Climate Action Plan seeks to reach Net Zero by 2030, including

by reducing vehicle journeys by 27 percent, retrofitting all our buildings to be well insulated and energy efficient and reducing flood risk for residents by increasing the amount of green surface in the borough. Through our transport policies, we have provided more support for those who wish to walk, cycle, scoot or wheel. For example, our award-winning Kerbside Strategy was launched two years is aimed at reclaiming 25 percent of space that's normally used for parking.

How does the Kerbside Strategy benefit people in Lambeth?

RC. The kerbside is the largest public space controlled by the council with a size equivalent to 194 football pitches. The strategy helps unlock that by aiming to change the

use of around a third of this space by moving away from on street parking and towards other, more sustainable uses.

What can this space be used for instead?

RC. We have already reclaimed a significant amount of kerbside space to create community parklets where neighbours can come together and apply to manage their own piece of kerbside space. They could create a new green area with community planting, or play

space for local children. It is about rethinking how we interact with the areas where we live and how to make the space work for everyone more fairly.

What is the focus for the next 12 months?

RC. We are now implementing the fourth phase of the Lambeth Transport Strategy that sets out how we want people to move around our borough in the future. It outlines our Healthy Streets approach that looks at targeted

Reimagined schemes that support high street businesses.

What does that look like?

RC. There are three elements to Healthy Streets. The first is using targeted traffic filters to restrict vehicles from entering Healthy Neighbourhoods so people feel safer to move around and can use kerbside space for community benefits like more cycle storage hangars. We are working with residents and businesses on

What is the Reimagined programme?

RC. Last year we launched a trial Kennington Oval Reimagined project that has transformed the streets outside the Kia Oval Cricket Ground. We have introduced a trial Healthy Neighbourhood and worked with two local primary schools to create more space for children to play in the streets without worrying about road danger or congestion. We are now working with businesses to look at how we can transform areas of the high street to make them less dominated by traffic, while supporting the local economy.

interventions in local streets to improve peoples' lives and how we are working with residents and businesses to respond to their needs. Creating more space for children and young people to play is vital to our ambitions. We want children to feel safe in the streets.

What is a Healthy Streets approach?

RC. Our approach is to focus on how improvements to local streets can benefit people's physical and mental health, give them more of a say in how their streets are used. We are trying to think differently. It's a three-pronged strategy of Healthy Neighbourhoods, new and enhanced School Streets and

developing proposals that will make streets safer and more accessible. We want to come up with proposals that work for everyone and make it easier for people to leave their cars at home and be more active in their communities.

What are **School Streets?**

RC. The council has established more than 40 school streets where vehicle access is restricted on nearby roads around drop-off and picking-up times. This makes it safer for parents, children and school staff as they do not have to navigate gueues of traffic at peak times, while also improving air quality and reducing road danger.

What is the council's vision for neighbourhoods of the future?

RC. One of the key elements of our Lambeth 2030 borough plan is making sure neighbourhoods can face up to the challenges of the future. That means making streets work for local people, creating more space for children to play and enjoy themselves and give people a real say on the future of their local area. We want to work closely with our residents and businesses to ensure that they can continue to thrive and feel supported as we move towards a more sustainable future.

Deniece Campbell (pictured with the Mayor of Lambeth) won three awards as Parent Carer of the year, **Neurodiversity Carer of the Year and Carer Volunteer of** the Year 2024.

"There are thousands of carers in Lambeth, but many are unaware of the support they can get. They don't know their rights or that there's financial support towards the extra costs of complex health and social care needs.

"I know carers from minority communities face challenges getting the help they need due to language barriers and other inequalities. As a carer it's easy to neglect your own health, so I signpost people to wellbeing support - such as the sessions at St Mark's Church Kennington, Carers Hub, Carers4Carers, Autism Voice and the Black Men's Consortium.

"I've been caring for 16 years, since my youngest was diagnosed with a learning disability and autism and our outreach worker told me to apply for Carers Allowance.

"As an advocate, I helped shape Lambeth's Carers Strategy, advocating for culturally appropriate peer support - which we now have in place."

Deniece dedicated her awards to all carers, and her sons.

Brixton Remembers: 26 Years United Against Hate

Brixton is the first London location to host an annual April Act of Remembrance for the nail bomb attacks on three communities.

In April 1999 the Black, Asian and LGBTQ+ communities of Brixton, Brick Lane and Soho were targeted by nail bomb attacks over 14 days.

- The first bomb targeted the Black community on Saturday 17 April, at the side of the Iceland Store on Brixton's Electric Avenue.
- The second nail bomb targeted the Asian community, exploding in a car boot outside the Sweet and Spicy Restaurant, Brick Lane on 24 April.
- The third bomb was aimed at LGBTQ+ people in the Admiral Duncan bar, Old Compton Street, on Friday 30 April.

Since April 2010, the anti-hate crime charity 17-24-30 National **HCAW** has organised annual April Acts of Remembrance for all three communities on all three dates.

The numbers 17, 24, and 30 represent the dates of the London nail bomb attacks in April 1999, which targeted the Black, Asian, and LGBTQ+ communities in Brixton, Brick Lane, and Soho, respectively. The organisation was founded to commemorate these events and to promote awareness and prevention of hate crimes through various initiatives. including the annual National Hate Crime Awareness Week.






Circus history starts here

Roll up! Roll up! Discover Lambeth's role in the birth of the Circus.

Ringside! - a new exhibition at Lambeth Archives - celebrates the birthplace of the circus with Astley's Amphitheatre, established over 250 years ago. This exhibition highlights Astley's rivals and the enduring legacy of circus performers that continues to this day.

The exhibition narrates the story of the original location in Lambeth (now the site of St Thomas' Hospital) where the circus began. It traces the evolution of today's

circus acts - clowns, acrobats, and more - back to Philip Astley's trick-riding displays, sword work, rope acts, and tumbling performances in Lambeth.

Featuring posters, illustrations from the Lambeth Archives Collection, photographs, and objects curated by Charlie Holland, the exhibition showcases some of the many circus families who lived in Lambeth, performed worldwide, and became international stars.

Community influencers

Cyclists encouraging others to get in the saddle

Over the last two years, 30 novice cyclists were provided with bikes, equipment, and training to become Community Influencers.

In collaboration with Peddle My Wheels, the project worked with Lambeth residents as they navigated cycling in Lambeth while sharing their experiences to inspire others.

Community Influencer Joel is a teacher and used the project to encourage his pupils to cycle more. His pupils noticed him commuting to school on his bike, and he would joke with them, challenging them to race. Joel would then use the student bike rack at school, rather

than the staff one, to show pupils it was safe to use. Eventually, he started seeing more of his pupils cycling to school rather than just for fun.

Community Influencer Emily opted for a cargo bike to help her and her young family travel around the borough. She wanted to show that they were safe for families to use, and worked with Peddle My Wheels to learn the routes she planned to use. She said, "It's certainly made our lives better, and I hope that Lambeth can continue to support initiatives to provide access for more residents."

New Council Homes delivered

Affordable Housing Development at Patmos Lodge

Lambeth Council has recently completed its latest affordable housing development in Oval, providing much-needed homes for residents. Patmos Lodge includes 31 new homes, with 61 per cent designated for social rent. The new homes range from one and twobedroom apartments to larger family homes with three or four bedrooms. Additionally, 12 homes are available for private sale, with the proceeds reinvested into further affordable housing projects in the borough.

Councillor Claire Holland, Leader of Lambeth Council, emphasised the importance of building new affordable homes to address the housing crisis in the borough and across London. She highlighted that Patmos Lodge is an example of the high-quality, energy-efficient, and sustainable homes the council

aims to provide. The new homes will meet the needs of homeless families in Lambeth, offering them a permanent place to live.

Beyond housing, the project has created numerous job opportunities for Lambeth residents. Ten new jobs have been created, along with four apprenticeships and three work experience placements for students and young people. This initiative not only addresses the housing needs of the community but also contributes to the local economy by providing employment opportunities.

Patmos Lodge is one of the latest affordable housing developments completed by Lambeth Council. Further new affordable housing units are expected to be delivered in 2025 with the completion of projects at Roman Rise, Fenwick Place, and Fenwick South on the Central Hill and Fenwick estates.

The homes at Patmos Lodge have been built to high-energy efficiency standards. Each property is equipped with air-source heat pumps and solar panels, and the interiors are designed to be airy with large windows and balconies. Additionally, cycle storage options are provided to encourage active travel and communal gardens provide green space for residents, promote biodiversity and offer a natural environment within an urban setting.


