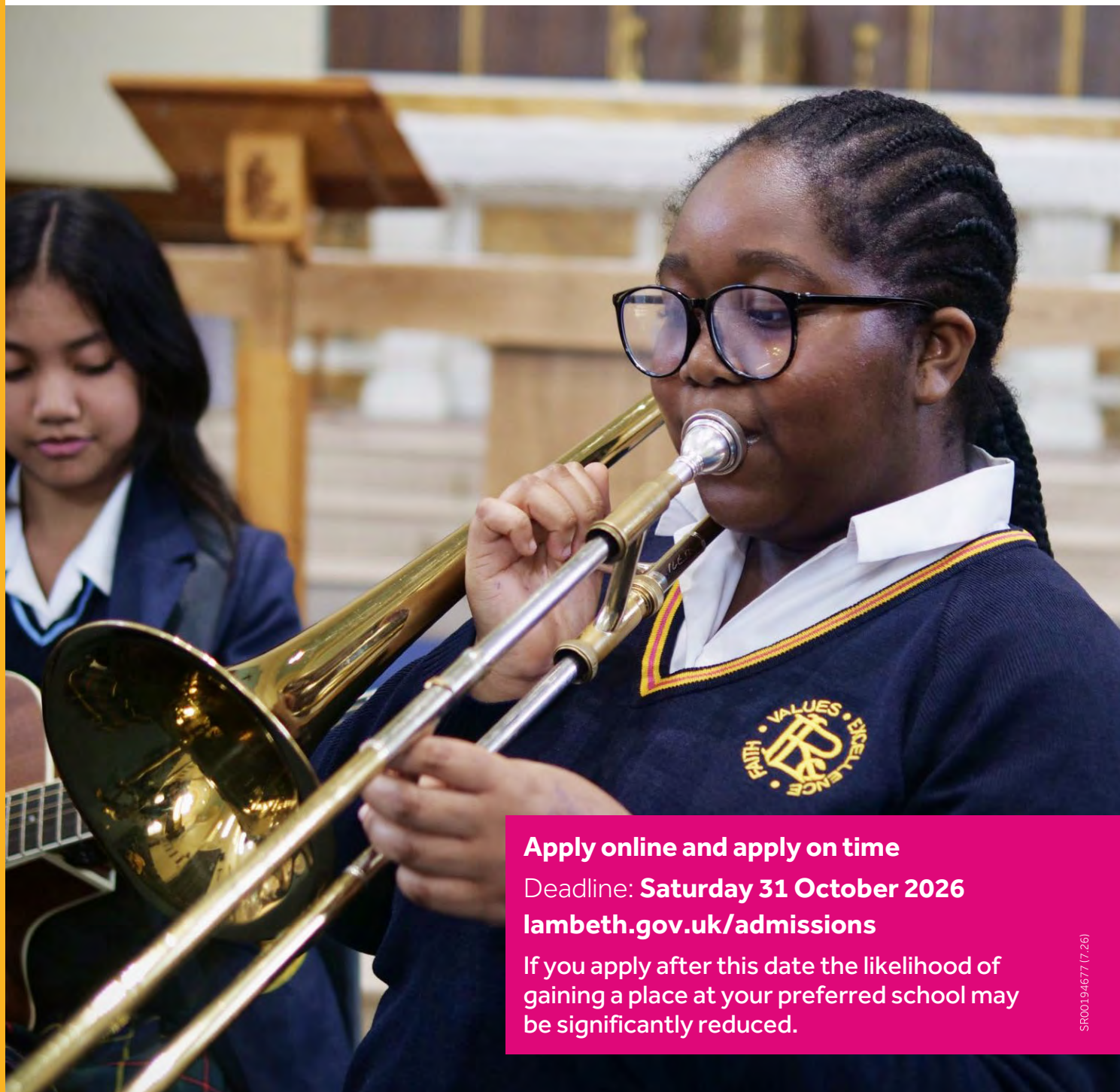

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Brief guide to commonly used terms in this booklet

Academies are publicly funded schools that provide free education to pupils of all abilities. They are established by sponsors from business, faith or voluntary groups. They receive funding directly from the Department for Education. Each academy has its own admissions policy.

Community schools are run by the local council. It employs the school’s staff, and runs the admission procedure. Their running costs are met from public funds which come through the local council (mainly council tax and grants from central government). They provide free education. Community schools in the same borough share an admissions policy.

Department for Education (DfE) is responsible for education and children’s services.

Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) An Education, Health and Care Plan (often referred to as an EHCP) is for children and young people aged up to 25 who need more support than is available through normal school based special educational needs support. EHC Plans identify education, health and social needs a child or young person has and sets out the additional support required to meet these needs.

Education, Learning and Skills a group of services in Lambeth Council that brings together all services for education under one banner.

Foundation schools have their running costs met from public funds which come through the local council. They provide free education. Each foundation school has it’s own admissions policy.

Free Schools are all-ability state-funded schools. They are non-selective and free to attend, and not controlled by a local authority. Each free school has its own admissions policy.

Local Authority (LA) The borough/ local council.

Ofsted The national Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted), is the government department responsible for inspecting schools and reporting on standards of achievement and the quality of education provided.

Parents/carers refers to all carers and legal guardians.

Special schools cater for children who have an Education, Health and Care Plan and whose special needs are such that they cannot be met in a mainstream school. All children attending a special school must have an Education, Health and Care Plan.

Voluntary-aided schools are set up by voluntary bodies, usually churches, but have their running costs met from public funds which come through the local council. They provide free education. The voluntary-aided schools in Lambeth have very close links to their church, and are often referred to as church schools. Each voluntary-aided school has its own admissions policy.

Introduction

Starting secondary school is an exciting time for your child and we know how scary and important it is for parents/carers to make the right choice. Choosing the right secondary school is an important stage in your child’s life.

In Lambeth, we have many excellent secondary schools that offer high quality learning opportunities, very good facilities and highly professional staff dedicated to meeting pupils’ needs. In all our schools great attention is devoted to developing well-rounded, successful and confident young people. Each school is slightly different and you should use every opportunity to visit the schools either physically or virtually, hear what others have to say about them and read any websites and external reports that you can.

What is right for one child may not be right for another and it is most important that you and your child choose the school that will best meet their needs.

Quality of education
About 95% of all schools in Lambeth are judged ‘good’ or ‘outstanding’ by Ofsted. The reports are easily available to read online on individual schools’ websites or on the Ofsted website [ofsted.gov.uk/reports](https://www.ofsted.gov.uk/reports). Another measure of the quality of education is vocational, A Level and GCSE results. In addition to enabling young people to do well academically

at the end of Y11 and sixth form, schools also provide a wide range of extracurricular activities which support the development of young people’s sporting achievement, musical and creative ability as well as making a contribution to society. SEND and Special Schools
Lambeth has a number of excellent secondary special schools which are well resourced to meet the needs of our children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) including those who have an education health and care plan. A number of mainstream schools in the local authority also operate resource bases within the school with dedicated staff and provision our children with SEND. Please speak to your child’s Special Education Needs Coordinator (SENCo) to get more information or contact the SENCo of the school you are interested in applying to.

Secondary transfer and the Pan-London co-ordinated admissions procedure

This booklet guides parents/carers and their children through the admission process for secondary school for September 2026 entry. It contains general information and highlights 11 stages of the process that parents/carers must follow to submit their application.

Please read this information **carefully** as it is important you use it to make the best choices for your child. If you are unsure about any aspect of the transfer process please contact Lambeth School Admissions Team on 020 7926 9503 and/or attend one of the secondary transfer meetings organised to provide information and support. Please see the inside cover for a guide to terms used in this booklet.

If your child has an Education, Health and Care Plan, do not complete a Common Application Form (CAF). Please contact your home borough's SEND Team for details about applications for secondary school.

General information
Legislation and purpose
The Education Act 2002 and the School Admissions Code 2021 provides a framework that seeks to ensure that on National Offer Day as many children as possible (whose parents/carers have applied for a school place 'on time') receive an offer (if an offer can be made) at a school they have expressed a preference for.

Basics of the procedure

- The aim is that every child will receive the single highest preference offer possible.

- To make it easy to apply and fair for parents/carers.
- Well organised with good communication between schools and boroughs.

What the procedure cannot do

- It cannot guarantee every child a school place. This is because some schools receive many more applications than places available, and this may be the case for all schools applied for. In this instance, allocations of offers for schools not applied for will be made where possible.
- It cannot guarantee your child will get a place at your first preference school.
- It cannot limit some multiple offers being made **after 1 March 2027**, (but Lambeth School Admissions Team will be aware of them and able to ensure that parents/carers reject one of these offers quickly).



How to apply – essential information

- Parents/carers only need to complete one Common Application Form (CAF) to apply for up to six schools anywhere in London excluding fee-paying.

Secondary transfer meetings for parents/carers

- The deadline for applications is **Saturday 31 October 2026** via **lambeth.gov.uk/admissions**
- All parents/carers who apply on time will know what school their child has been offered (if any) on **1 March 2027** This offer will be the highest preference offer that can be made.
- The procedure provides an easier to understand and fairer admissions process for both parents/carers and schools.

Lambeth School Admissions Team do not decide which school a child is offered. There is a process undertaken together with School Admissions Teams in other boroughs. Decisions about how a child's application for a school is ranked are made by the schools admissions in accordance with their admissions/oversubscription criteria.

If your child is being taught in a year group different to their chronological age (out of cohort) you need to apply using a paper Common Application Form and provide documentation from their current school to confirm this placement. Applications will be considered on a child-by-child basis by the admissions authority for the schools applied for as they have to consider, but do not have to accept, your child to continue out of cohort.

What is an admissions authority?
A schools admissions authority – the body of people who make decisions about admissions – will determine which children can be offered a place at a school in accordance with the admissions/oversubscription criteria for that school.

For community schools the admissions authority is the LA itself and for an Academy, Voluntary-Aided (religious), Foundation or Free school it is the governing body of that school.

Where the school is over-subscribed, the school's admissions authority will use their admission criteria to determine the order (rank) in which applicants will be offered places.

An admissions authority may require parents/carers to complete a **Supplementary Information Form (SIF)** requesting information which is not contained on the CAF, e.g. church attendance. This form is obtained from the school or if in Lambeth via **lambeth.gov.uk/admissions** and needs to be sent back to the school and not the borough by the **school's deadline**.

School staff will not know what number preference their school has been listed on the CAF, all are considered the same at the same time.

11 stages parents/ carers must follow

Stage 1 Research

It is important to consider as much information as possible about the schools you wish to apply to. Check whether your child is likely to be offered a place based on the school’s published admissions criteria which, for Lambeth schools, can be found on the individual school’s pages in this booklet. You can find out information about schools by doing the following:

- **Read this booklet carefully and look at the admissions criteria for each school.** Then for each school consider ‘does my child meet these criteria’. If they do it may increase your child’s chances of gaining a place at the school.
- Check how offers were made for National Offer Day for 2025/26 and 2026/27 entry. Details for Lambeth schools can be viewed via the secondary transfer 2027/28 page from **lambeth.gov.uk/admissions** These details only relate to the 2025/26 and 2026/27 intakes and children applying, which will vary each year. Therefore this information cannot be used to guarantee how offers will be made for 2027/28 intake and is only made available to give an indication of how the admissions process impacted on Lambeth schools last year.
- Contact the school directly for a copy of their prospectus or visit their website.



- Go to the school’s open days or evenings. Details of open days are listed in full on the school’s pages in this booklet or visit their websites (details on page 21).
- Talk to your child’s primary school headteacher, learning mentor or class teacher.
- Read the latest Ofsted report for the schools you are interested in. These are available for viewing or downloading from **ofsted.gov.uk**
- If the school you want is in a different borough, contact that borough for their booklet or visit their websites (details on page 72).

Stage 2 Apply on time and apply online!

The deadline for applications is Saturday 31 October 2026. If you apply after this date the likelihood of gaining a place at your preferred school may be significantly reduced.

You must complete the CAF for your home borough regardless of whether you are applying for schools in or outside of that borough. The home borough is the borough where you and your child are residing at the time of application, even if you have been placed in temporary accommodation. Please check that your child’s address is in Lambeth borough before completing the Lambeth CAF. Residents of boroughs other than Lambeth who wish to apply for a Lambeth school must complete

the CAF provided by the home borough in which they live. The details of your application will then be passed on to Lambeth Council by your home borough. If you are not a Lambeth resident please contact your home borough for advice.

Using your research, list up to six schools in the order you prefer them, whether they are Lambeth schools or schools in another borough, on your child’s CAF. Do not include private (fee-paying) schools, as applications for these are made directly to the schools on their own form. The more schools you list on the form, the greater the chances your child has of being offered a school of your choice. However, please do not list schools you do not want your child to attend ‘just to fill up the form’.

The preferred way for Lambeth residents to apply for a secondary school place is online. This can be done via **lambeth.gov.uk/admissions** from **1 September 2026**. Please view pages 18 and 19 which provide a step-by-step guide of how to apply online.

For parents/carers who do not have internet access or cannot apply online, a limited amount of paper CAFs will be available after 1 September 2026 at Lambeth Customer Service Centre, Lambeth Civic Centre, 6 Brixton Hill, London SW2 1EG. There are facilities available at Lambeth Civic Centre for families to apply online.

Whether you are completing an online or paper CAF we are encouraging parents/carers to submit

their application no later than **23 October 2026**, to allow sufficient time for processing and checking. The completed paper CAFs can be handed in to Lambeth Civic Centre (an appointment to do this is required and can be booked online at **lambeth.gov.uk**) or alternatively sent by post to:

Please ensure that you use the correct postal charge to make sure your application reaches Lambeth School Admissions Team.

We recommend that you use recorded delivery to ensure you have proof of postage.

Any CAFs received after **31 October 2026** will be deemed late and will not be processed until **after 1 March 2027**, when offers have been generated for ‘on time’ applications.

If your child has an Education, Health and Care Plan do not complete a CAF: please see pages 79-81 for further information.

Please note that any false or deliberately misleading information given on this form and/or supporting information may render your child’s application invalid and lead to any offer of a place being withdrawn.

Stage 3 Proof of address

The application address stated on your child’s CAF must be the address which you and your child currently live at, even if you have been placed in temporary accommodation.

Applications received without all the required proof of address documents for the parents/ carers and the child may result in the child’s application being withdrawn if the address cannot be verified. This means that your child will not receive an offer of a school place on 1 March 2027.

If your child lives between two homes, ie. split custody between parents, just one of the parental addresses can be used for the application and for



distance purposes. The address must be agreed between both parents/ carers and is the address where the child is registered. This is normally the address to which the child benefit is paid.* If proof of address is not received, then this may delay the processing of your application.

All applications must be submitted (whether online or on a paper form) with all the required documents by **31 October 2026**. Addresses of parent/ carers and children may also be checked against Lambeth Council Tax and benefits records to aid verification.

At least one of the following documents to confirm your name and address as the applicant.

- Current financial year’s Council Tax letter or statement. This must be supplied if you are the council tax payer.

- Copy of the tenancy agreement.
- Copy of a benefit letter no more than 12 months old or a current financial year’s Universal Credit letter/print-out which includes the child’s name.

Then at least one of the following as well:

- Copy of a benefit letter no more than 12 months old or a current financial year’s Universal Credit letter/print-out which includes the child’s name – if not already provided from above list.
- Current TV licence.
- Copy of current utility bill (excluding mobile phone) no more than 3 months old.
- Driving licence.

Applications must include one of the following documents to confirm your child’s name and address

- *Child Benefit letter for the current financial year (please copy all pages of the letter to include the home address on the first page and child’s name on the second or a current financial year’s Universal Credit letter/ print-out which includes the child’s name.
- Child’s National Health Service registration card or a medical letter or prescription that is no more than 12 months old (this can also be used to confirm your child’s date of birth).
- Child Tax Credit Award notice for the current financial year (please copy all pages of the letter to include the home address, parents name and child’s details).

- Immigration documents that show address – if applicable.

*If you or your partner are affected by the High Income Child Benefit charge and have decided to stop Child Benefit payments, HM Revenue and Customs have confirmed that you cans till request a copy of your entitlement reward letter despite the fact that your payments have stopped.

If you are unable to submit any or only some of the documents listed above for you and/or your child, you will need to obtain a sworn affidavit or affirmation through a solicitor. This affidavit or affirmation must be signed by a Solicitor holding a current practising certificate issued by the Solicitors Regulation Authority and stamped with the company stamp. It mus must include parent and child(ren)’s full names and address, the date you started living at that address and the child(ren)’s date(s) of birth.

Please note that Lambeth Council cannot contribute towards the cost of obtaining this.

Proof of address documents requested by Lambeth School Admissions at the time of application are required for application processing purposes only. Schools may request additional proof of address documents for their own registration purposes. The documents they request may vary from the list used by Lambeth School Admissions.

Please be advised that your child’s place can still be withdrawn if there are inconsistencies with the



documents presented to Lambeth and the school.

Documents can either be scanned or a clear image taken on a smart phone or tablet, and then attached to your online application once the application has been initially submitted. This must be done before the on time application deadline, **31 October 2026**. (This is in addition to any other documents you wish to include as stated in stage 4).

Alternatively all the documents (copies not originals) can be posted to Lambeth School Admissions Team at PO Box 80771, London, SW2 9QQ or taken to the Lambeth Civic Centre, 6 Brixton Hill, London SW2 1EG (by appointment). The documents must have your child’s name, date of birth and the online application reference clearly stated on the top and be stapled together.

If you have to submit a paper CAF, all proof of address and supporting documents (where applicable) **must** be attached to the application form.

If you have any problems supplying

these documents, please contact us as soon as possible.

Stage 4 Proof of child’s date of birth

The secondary Lambeth CAF is only for children born between 01/09/15 and 31/08/16. Using this form for children outside this age group will result in the form being invalid (and it will not be processed, unless the child is being taught out of cohort).

You must attach proof of your child’s date of birth to the CAF – either a copy of their birth certificate, passport or EU National Identity Card. Alternatively this could be a copy of your child’s NHS card, medical letter or doctors prescription stating the child’s date of birth.

Stage 5
Provide additional documentation
In additional to the proof of address documents, you may need to submit additional supporting documentation with your child’s CAF by 31 October 2026.

Documents can either be scanned or a clear image taken on a smart phone or tablet, and uploaded to an online application. If you do not have access to a scanner, documents (copies not originals) can be posted to Lambeth School Admissions Team at PO Box 80771, London, SW2 9QQ or taken to Lambeth Civic Centre, 6 Brixton Hill, London SW2 1EG (by appointment).

The documents must have your child’s name, date of birth and the online application reference clearly stated on the top and be stapled together. If you have any problems



supplying these documents, please contact us as soon as possible.

Medical/social

If you want your child’s application to be considered as a medical/ social application (where a school has this criterion) because you believe that a particular school is especially able to meet your child’s needs above others in the area, **you must submit professional documentation outlining this with the CAF by 31 October 2026 for consideration.** Submitting this documentation will not automatically guarantee that your child will be prioritised under this criterion.

Children of school staff

If you work at a school that has criteria for prioritising children of staff members, supporting documentation

from your workplace must be submitted before the deadline for consideration. Submitting this documentation will not automatically guarantee that your child will be prioritised under this criterion.

Looked After Children (LAC) or Previously Looked After Children (PLAC)

A Looked After Child is a child that is currently in the care of the Local Council (foster or residential care). A Previously Looked After Child is stated as being the following in the 2021 School Admissions Code, paragraph 1.7:

Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order). All references to previously looked after children in this Code mean such children who were adopted (or subject to child arrangements orders or special guardianship orders) immediately following having been looked after and those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

For Looked After Children or Previously Looked After Children a letter from your child’s social worker, or a copy of court papers must be submitted with the CAF by the deadline for the correct school’s admissions criterion to be given.

Request to be taught outside cohort

If your child is being taught in a year group different to their chronological age (out of cohort) you must provide documentation to confirm this placement from their current school. This will aid the admissions authority’s decision whether your child will be accepted to continue to be taught out of cohort.

Stage 6
Supplementary Information Forms (SIFs)
In addition to the required documentation already stated, some schools require applicants to complete a Supplementary Information Form. Please check the school’s information in this booklet, particularly the ‘how to apply’ section, to check which schools require these and their deadline. For schools in other boroughs, please check their literature or websites.

The SIFs provide additional information needed for the school’s admissions criteria to be applied fully. Such information may include religious observance or specialism details. They may also require further documentation to be submitted such as Pupil Premium documentation. For the



Lambeth schools sharing a banding test, the SIFs are used by school staff to invite children to the test. It is very important that the SIFs are completed and sent to the schools by their set deadline otherwise your child may miss out on a preferred place.

Stage 7
Admissions tests
Some schools require children to sit a test. The scores are used for banding, to ensure children of all abilities are considered.

Full/further details of the admission test dates and of how the test is used are published with the school’s admissions criteria. Your child will be invited to the test by school staff once a SIF has been received on-time. In addition to this some schools have bursary auditions. Please check which schools use testing and when it is.

If test dates clash you must inform the person who sent the invite in case there are any additional test dates. It is important that your child sits these tests where used otherwise your child may miss out on a place at preferred school.

This does not directly effect any Lambeth schools, but if you are a Lambeth resident applying for out of borough schools which have an ability or aptitude test, the result of which will be known after 31 October, and the result of your child’s test means you wish to change your application preference, please email schooladmissions@lambeth.gov.uk by 12 December for these to be accommodated.

If you have questions about test arrangements, please check relevant school websites, or contact the school(s) directly.

Stage 8 Change of circumstances

The Lambeth School Admissions Team will consider your application using the details you provide on your form.

If you move address you must inform the School Admissions Team of your new address, the date of the move and provide new proof of address documents as soon as possible

after the date of the move so we are able to contact you if we need further information or to communicate the outcome of your application. A change of address form can be found on our webpage. You also need to inform us in writing if you have a change of medical circumstances or a sibling starts at a preferred school.

Please note that changes to preferences after the deadline for on time applications are not permitted.

If you inform your council of your change of address **before 12 December 2026**, the School

Admissions Team will be able to take this into account when preferences are being considered. If you change your address after 12 December 2026 and this means that you wish to change your preferences you will need to contact the council to find out what to do next.

Stage 9 National Offer Day – Monday 1 March 2027

If you applied online and signed up to text messages you will receive an email and text message on the evening of 1 March 2027 informing you to log in to your admissions account and view the official outcome of the application.

Only if you applied using a paper CAF will an outcome notification letter be posted out first class post on **1 March 2027**. Details of what you can do next if eg. your child was not offered your first preference, will be on the secondary transfer page via **lambeth.gov/admissions** and included with any letter sent. Some schools may also send their own offers letters to parents/carers after 1 March 2027. Responses to those letters should be made according to the school’s directions.

Your child will be offered the single highest preference possible on the CAF. For the example shown on the next page, the child’s third preference was offered as they were not ranked high enough by the school’s admissions authority to be offered the first or second preference.

Although the child could have been offered their fourth or fifth, these were not offered as the higher third preference could be offered.

**Preference Status meanings

Offered

This is the school your child has been made an offer to attend.

Declined

Because a higher offer has been made, and the offer made must be a single offer by law, this lower preference became invalid and was declined.

Pending

Child has not been able to be offered a place at this school at present. This is because the school had more applications than places, and offers have been made according to the school’s published admissions criteria. Other children had a higher priority than the child under the school’s published admission criteria or lived closer to the school if considered for the same criterion.

Allocated Offers

If your child is not able to be made an offer at one of their preferred schools on **1 March 2027**, Lambeth School Admissions, in line with statutory requirements, will seek to allocate a place at a Lambeth school

that has vacancies after all other possible offers have been made. This is for Lambeth residents only, other boroughs will support their own residents in a similar manner.

Decisions on where to allocate places will be made on the basis of distance to the school. (i.e. the nearest school to the child’s home address that identifies a vacancy). Please note that allocations will be made according to the number of vacancies there are in the borough. An allocation will be made to a school that parents/ carers did not originally apply for. In instances where an allocated offer has been made, all preferences will be continue to be listed as “pending”.

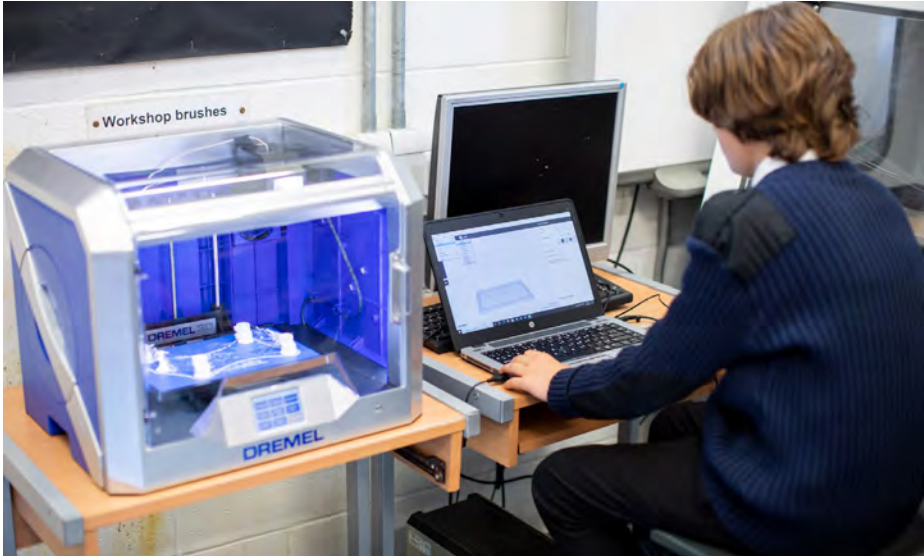
be notified as soon as an offer can be made. This will be after **1 March 2027** however please note that there is no set date for late application outcomes to be notified.

Lambeth School Admissions Team will assist wherever possible if your child has not been offered a school place to ensure that they have one for the start of September 2027.

Stage 10 Accepting the offer

The deadline to accept offers, online or using a reply form sent to paper applicants is Monday 15 March 2027. Failure to meet this deadline may mean that your child could lose their place.

We strongly advise that you accept the offer made on National Offer Day even if it is not your first preference to ensure your child has a place for September 2027. Offers will continue to be made after National Offer Day.

If an offer for a higher preference is made later on, you can then reject the original offer. Where allocations are made, again we advise that these are accepted until you receive an offer from a school you selected on your application.

Stage 11 Next steps

If your child was not offered your first preference school, we advise you to follow the steps below.

Waiting lists

Ensure that your child’s name is on the waiting list for the school(s) that you applied for and were placed higher than the school offered on your CAF. Lambeth community schools will automatically keep your child’s name on their waiting lists until 31 December 2026. Please check with other schools or boroughs to ensure that your child’s name is on their waiting list as this may not be an automatic process. Parents/carers need to be aware that if their child’s name is on a school’s waiting list, their name may go up or down depending

on how the admissions criteria applies to others on the waiting list. Late applications received after the closing date of **31 October 2026** will be considered after National Offer Day, **1 March 2027**. Please note that **after National Offer Day**, once late applications are considered, waiting lists will be re-ranked in line with the admissions criteria for the school(s). This will continue to be the case if any additional late applications are received.

Apply for other schools

You can apply for further schools whilst your child’s name is on the waiting list for other schools or if you have accepted an allocated offer. If requested, Lambeth School Admissions Team can provide you with information about schools that have vacancies after 22 March 2027.

Second (or subsequent) applications can only be made using a paper CAF, which will be available after 1 March 2027 to download from our website or obtained from Lambeth Civic Centre.

Completed forms need to be returned to the Lambeth Civic Centre or posted to the School Admissions Team (address on the form). This is in addition to any necessary Supplementary Information Forms being completed and sent to the schools (where used).

Parents/carers of these new applicants will be notified as soon as an offer can be made, or receive a letter stating that no offer can be

made from the CAF and Stage 10 can be followed again.

If your application for a school place was submitted on-time, appeals need to be lodged by Tuesday 30 March 2027 for them to be heard before the summer holidays.

For late applications, an appeal should be lodged within 20 school days of receipt of application outcome letter. Appeals lodged after these dates will



be heard within 40 school days of the appeal deadline or 30 school days of being lodged, whichever is the later date.

Democratic Services will write to you regarding the arrangements for considering your appeal. Your appeal will be heard by an Independent Appeals Panel made up of panellists with knowledge of education issues. You will be invited to attend the appeal hearing and make representations in person to the Independent Appeals Panel.

For the schools listed in column one, you will be informed in writing about the outcome by the Democratic Services Team. For other Lambeth schools, the clerk for that appeal panel will write to you.

Lambeth Council only have a very limited amount of paper Common Application Forms (CAFs) available and these will normally be made available for parents/carers who do not have or cannot get access to the internet. Pages 18 and 19 show a step-by-step guide to making an online application. For 2026 secondary school entry 99% of parents/carers who applied on time applied online. Step-by-step guide to online Admissions applications

This is just a short step-by-step guide to help you submit an online application. However, please note that there is also a FAQ and an Admissions tutorial function (which can be accessed before you register onto the online system).

Step 1 – Create an account The child’s parent/carer needs to log their details. Only **one** parent/carer can do this as the system only allows one parent to register one application per child. This is so that an identified email address can be linked to a named person. It is important that the person registering has parental responsibility for the child and both child and parent lives at the same address noted on the online form.

If you already have a London Grid for Learning account use that log in and check your details are still correct before continuing. Otherwise you will need to create an account.

Step 2 – Child’s details The parent/carer must input their child’s name as listed on their birth certificate or passport in this section. They must also use their (both the parent and the child’s) current address. The online secondary school applications are only for children born between 01/09/2015 and 31/08/2016.

Step 3 – Add your school preferences
Using the pre-populated drop-down lists,

1. Select the borough the school is in.
2. Select the school you want for the first preference. You can also choose a school using the ‘map’ or ‘keywords’ function. You can apply for up to 6 schools
3. Please ensure that you select the correct school especially when there are schools with similar names in the same borough.
4. Once the school has been added you can also add details about any siblings or relevant medical/social details if applicable.
5. If the school being applied to needs you to also complete a Supplementary Information Form (SIF), this will automatically be flagged up by the system. Please ensure that all SIFs are completed and returned to the school in time.

Schools selected can be moved up or down, added to or deleted up until the 31 October 2026 deadline.

Once the schools have been selected, you must check whether they are correct before moving to the next step.

Step 4 – Submit application
You will then be required to read and accept the declarations.

Once you have read the declaration, **click on the ‘submit application’ button.**

Step 5 – Attach documentation
Once the application is submitted, you will receive an email confirming submission with the reference number, along with a reminder about what schools require SIFs. You must then **upload all the necessary proof of address documentation (as stated on page 8-9) using the ‘Attach a document’ button** from this page. You can also **attach any medical or social or other such documentation** you wish to be considered by **31 October 2026**.

You must ensure that you re-submit your application if you make any amendments **before** the 31 October 2026 deadline.

We have a broad curriculum, where the full national curriculum is provided with additional time for English and Maths to ensure students have a solid foundation upon which to build. We benefit from nationally recognised Ark Mastery curriculums in a number of subjects. These are curriculums followed in schools across the country and developed by a team of curriculum experts alongside our expert teachers. This allows for our students to sit common assessments alongside students from other schools and for results to be analysed in depth so gaps for students are known and addressed.

A nurturing, calm and purposeful environment.
We believe that there is no limit, with hard work, optimism and perseverance, to what our young people can achieve. The small school environment means that we really do know every child. This, coupled with a dedicated team of staff means that we provide an environment that makes children feel safe, respected and ready to learn.

Wide ranging enrichment and extra-curricular activities
We offer a wider range of extra-curricular activities, before and after school, helping our students to uncover their passions, experience new opportunities and also win competitions! From basketball to baking, there are a number of clubs available for students to join. Our KS4 basketball team recently won Lambeth's Basketball Championship and younger students benefit from being coached by a professional basketball player. We have partnerships with a number of organisations including The Girls' Network, The Rio Ferdinand Foundation, The School of Hard Knocks and MESME, Maths Circles. We are proud to be the South-East London's host for Arsenal's pre-academy and their coaches help develop our school teams.

Students have access to free music lessons, and we encourage all students to take up an instrument. Through being part of the Ark Network, our students have the opportunity to be part of a choir of 39 schools and participate in music residencies, culminating with a yearly music gala at The Barbican.

SEN and additional needs
At our Academy we know that students may need different or additional support at specific times during their time in our school to be successful. Our school SENCO works closely with specialist services and all teachers to identify needs early and assess which interventions or specialist support is required. We have a Speech and Language Therapist who provides one-to-one and group sessions.

We have a dedicated inclusion area within the school so that students with needs always feel supported. As part of our pastoral care, we also have a family therapist and counselling services provided by Place2Be for students who may be going through difficulties requiring additional support.



Admissions criteria
In the event of there being more applications than spaces available, applications are considered against the criteria below. After the admission of students with an Education, Health and Care Plan, the criteria are applied in the following order:

- 1. 'Looked After Children'** and children who have previously been a 'Looked After Child' but immediately following this became subject to adoption, a child arrangements order or special guardianship order, including those who appear (to Ark Schools) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.
- 2. Children of staff at the school** where the member of staff has been recruited to a post where there is a demonstrable skill

shortage. Ark Schools must approve the Principal's assessment process and designation of such posts to confirm the staff members' eligibility under this criterion. Priority will be limited to one place for each form of entry in any year (i.e. 6 places in each 6-form year group).

- 3. Children who, at the time of admission, have a sibling who attends the school.** For this purpose, "sibling" means a whole, half or step-sibling or an adopted child resident at the same address.
- 4. Children of staff in the school** who have been employed at the school for two or more years at the time the application is submitted. Ark Schools must approve the Principal's decision to allocate places to staff under this criterion. Priority will be limited to one place for each form of entry in any year

School aims

The school aims to enable all students placed in our care to develop their potential to the full in a school environment firmly founded on Christian principles. We produce academic attainment in the context of equality of opportunity and Catholic spiritual and moral values as a vibrant and aspirational community of learning and faith.

Bishop Thomas Grant School was inspected by Ofsted in February 2025 and judged to be Outstanding in all five areas of the inspection: The quality of education; Behaviour and attitudes; Personal development; Leadership and management and

Sixth-form provision.

As an outstanding school, we work to ensure that all of our students make excellent progress and leave us as well rounded, resilient young men and women, ready and equipped to move on to the next stage of their lives.

Regardless of ability, all students are encouraged to work hard to develop their potential and make use of their strengths and abilities. We use a variety of rewards to celebrate students' successes and we believe strongly that they learn when they feel valued and their achievements are recognised.

Bishop Thomas Grant Roman Catholic School occupies an enviable position and enjoys attractive and extensive views over much of South West London. The school has outstanding accommodation and facilities. Students are able to learn in a clean, graffiti-free, well-ordered environment.

The school takes every opportunity to ensure that all subjects are taught by qualified teachers trained in the subject in which they teach. The teaching staff are conscientious, experienced and work with the students to create a friendly and supportive atmosphere.

Admissions Criteria

The school exists primarily to serve the Catholic community and Catholic

children always have priority of admission. This does not stop those of other faiths or none from applying.

Where the number of applications exceeds 180 the Governors will offer places using the following criteria in the order stated: -

- 1.** Looked after Catholic children and all previously looked after Catholic children who have been adopted or who have become the subject of a child arrangement order or special guardianship order. Catholic children who appear (to the admissions authority) to have been in state care outside of England and cease to be in state care outside of England as a result of being adopted.
- 2.** Baptised Catholic children, in possession of a Certificate of Practice. (See Note A)
- 3.** Baptised Catholic children. A baptismal certificate or evidence of reception into the Catholic Church must be provided.
- 4.** Looked after children and all previously looked after children who have been adopted or who have become the subject of a child arrangement order or special guardianship order. Children who appear (to the admissions authority) to have been in state care outside of England and cease to be in state care outside of England as a result of being adopted.

5. Children enrolled in the catechumenate. Evidence of enrolment in the catechumenate will be required.

6. Children who are members of Eastern Orthodox Churches. Evidence of Baptism will be required.

7. Children who are members of other faiths, Churches and denominations. Evidence of Baptism/dedication or evidence of membership required.

8. Any other children. The following order of priorities will be applied when applications within any of the above categories exceed the places available and it is necessary to decide between applications.

- a** A brother or sister on the school roll at the time of admission. Evidence of the relationship may be required. The governors will, where logistically possible, admit twins and all siblings from multiple births where one of the children is the last child ranked within the school's published admissions number.
- b.** Social, pastoral and medical needs which make the school particularly suitable for the child in question. Strong and relevant evidence must be provided, at the time of application, by an appropriate professional authority (eg qualified medical practitioner, education welfare officer, social worker or priest).

c. Proximity to the school from the child's home address, the distance measured in a straight line from the School entrance by the local authority using a geographical computerised information system. Evidence of residence is required with a utility bill dated within the last six months. Where the last remaining place is to be allocated and two or more children are deemed to live at the same distance from the school the place will be decided by the drawing of lots.

Admission of Children Outside their Normal Age Group

A request may be made for a child to be admitted outside their normal age group, for example if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. Any such request should be made in writing to the Headteacher at the school at the same time as the admission application is made. The governing body will make its decision about the request based on the circumstances of the case and in the best interests of the child. In addition to taking into account the views of the headteacher, including the headteacher's statutory responsibility for the internal organisation, management and control of the school, the governing body will take into account the views of the parents and of medical and/or education professionals, as appropriate.

Key Stage 4
In Key Stage 4, we ensure that students’ knowledge deepens and extends to ensure that they are best positioned for their national exams, but more importantly so that they can develop their love for their subjects. This is a child who is:
a is in the care of a local authority, or
b has subsequently been adopted or been made subject to child arrangement orders or a special guardianship order immediately after being in the care of the local authority.

Criterion 2: Sibling
This is a child with a brother or sister who already attends the academy and who will still attend the academy at the time of admission (for this purpose ‘siblings’ means a whole, half or step-brother/sister resident at the same address).

Criterion 3: Social/Medical needs
This is a child with a professionally-supported medical or social need whose application identifies that City Heights Academy is especially able to meet that need above other schools and outlines the difficulties that would occur if the child had to attend elsewhere. The decision to prioritise children on these grounds will be determined by the admissions committee of the academy.

Criterion 4: Distance
Priority will be given on the basis of distance between the point at the child’s home and the academy,

measured by a straight line. This measurement will be done using the SIA Datamap computerised mapping system. The measurement will be from a point at the child’s home to a central point in the academy’s grounds as determined by the software. The child’s home address will be the child’s permanent place of residency during term time. If parents are separated and share custody of the child, the address given should be that of the parent with whom the child spends most of the school week. This will normally be the address where Child Benefit is payable. If the parent making the application lives at a different address from the child a letter of explanation should be attached. An offer of a place made under this criterion will only be valid once proof of address has been given and confirmed. As a tiebreaker for all criteria, priority will be given to children living closest to the City Heights Academy site measured in accordance with the guidance in criterion 4.

Harris Academy Clapham admission arrangements for September 2026

Introductory Statement

Harris Academy Clapham is a mixed ability academy for girls and boys. It is a seven-form entry secondary school with a published admissions number (PAN) of 195.

Oversubscription Criteria

When the school is oversubscribed, after the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan or a Statement of Special Educational

Needs naming the school, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

1. Looked after children and children who were previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to adoption, a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order.
2. Priority will next be given to the siblings* of pupils attending the school at the time the application is received and who will not have left the school at the time of admission.
3. Priority will next be given to the children of staff who have been recruited to fill a skill-shortage area.
4. Priority will next be given to children attending the following feeder school – Glenbrook Primary School.
5. Remaining places will be offered on the basis of proximity of the child’s home address to the school. The point within the school to be used in any distance calculation will be the main entrance to the school building. Distances will be measured in a straight line from the child’s home address, with those living closer to the school receiving the higher priority. Where two or more applicants share a priority place, the child allocated will be determined by drawings of lots.

Tie-break

Random allocation will be used as a tiebreaker where there are two or more applicants who have equal ranking/are equal distance from the nodal point, but there is only one school place available.

Where random allocation is used, it is independently verified.

Children of multiple births

Random allocation will not be applied to multiple birth siblings (twins, triplets etc.) from the same family tied for the final place. We will admit them all and exceed our PAN.

Notes

Home address

The home address is where a child normally lives. Where a child lives with parents with shared parental responsibility, each for part of a week, the address where the child lives is determined using a joint declaration from the parents stating the pattern of residence. If a child’s residence is split equally between both parents, then parents will be asked to determine which residential address should be used for the purpose of admission to school. If no joint declaration is received where the residence is split equally by the closing date for applications, the home address will be taken as the address where the child is registered with the doctor. If the residence is not split equally between both parents, then the address used will be the address where the child spends the majority of their school week.

Sibling: ‘Sibling’ means a natural brother or sister, a half brother or sister, a legally adopted brother or sister or half brother or sister, a stepbrother or sister or other child living in the same household as part of the same family who, in any of these cases, will be living at the

same address at the date of their application for a place.

A ‘looked after child’: is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school. This includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 (see section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children’s Act 2002 (see section 46 adoption orders). Child arrangements orders are defined in s.8 of the Children Act 1989, as amended by s.12 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Child arrangements orders replace residence orders and any residence order in force prior to 22 April 2014 is deemed to be a child arrangements order. See Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 which defines a ‘special guardianship order’ as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child’s special guardian (or special guardians).

Late applications

All applications received by the LA after the closing date of 31 October 2026 will be considered to be late applications. Late applications will not be considered until after National Offer Day, 1 March 2027. If, following consideration of applicants the school is oversubscribed, parents may request that their child is placed on the school’s waiting list.

their normal age group Parents may request that their child is admitted outside their normal age group. To do so parents should include a request in their application, specifying why admission out of normal year group is being requested. When such a request is made, the academy trust will make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case and in the best interests of the child concerned, taking into account the views of the head teacher and any supporting evidence provided by the parent.

Appeals
All applicants refused a place have a right of appeal to an independent appeal panel constituted and operated in accordance with the School Admission Appeals Code. Admissions policy

Admissions to the school are made by the governing body. Parents must make an application for admission to Year 7 by completing the Common Application Form (CAF) provided by the Local Education authority in which the applicant lives. Applications for places in other year groups can be made at any time. The Governors will also require parents/carers to provide a Certificate of Catholic practice by 31 October 2026. Provision of a Certificate of Catholic practice is not mandatory. However, if one is not received, the Governors will not be able to apply the admission criteria, and the application will be considered under the 'Other Girls' category.

Criteria for Admission

Governors will admit applicants in the following order of priority:

1 Baptised Roman Catholic girls and

girls who are baptised members of Eastern Rite Churches in communion with Rome who are looked after and previously looked after girls who have been adopted, including girls whose families are members of the Ordinariate, where La Retraite is in possession of a Certificate of Catholic Practice.

2 Baptised Roman Catholic girls and baptised girls who are members of Eastern Rite Churches in communion with Rome and where La Retraite is in possession of a Certificate of Catholic practice.

3 Other looked after girls and all previously looked after girls who have been adopted or who have become the subject of a child arrangement order or special guardianship order.

4 Baptised Eastern Orthodox girls, where La Retraite is in possession of a Certificate of Catholic practice.

5 A girl whose parent is a member of staff, where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission is made and/or the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.

6 Christian girls baptised in other denominations who are enrolled in the catechumenate and where La Retraite is in possession of a Certificate of Catholic practice.

7 All other girls.

The following order of priorities will be applied when applications within any of the above categories exceed the places available and it is necessary to decide between applications.

Within each category 1 to 7 priority will be given to:

- i Girls who have a twin/triplet that have already been allocated a place
- ii Girls who have a sibling in years 7 to 12 at the time of application
- iii Girls who are students at St Bernadette Junior School, Clapham Park

Final tiebreaker

Within each category 1 to 7 in the event of an equal right to a place, priority is given to the girl who lives nearest to the school as measured by Lambeth LA's computerized mapping system. In cases where applicants have exactly the same distance between their home and the school, Lambeth LA will randomly allocate places on behalf of the Governors.

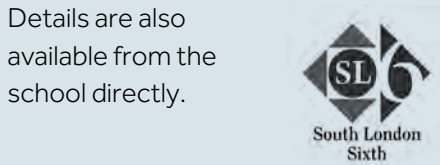

Our alumni leave our school as well-rounded, kind and aspirational young people. South Bank alumni have secured places at Oxford, Cambridge, Kings, LSE UCL universities alongside many others. Our alumni have also won prestigious scholarships and bursaries including the Stormzy Scholarship and the Formula 1 engineering scholarship.



Our transition process

It is important to us that students and their families feel the South bank sense of belonging as soon as possible. Following an offer from the Academy in March, you will be invited to a number of events to ensure that you and your child feel confident and settled when they start in September. These include: -A welcome letter and tasks -A transition day in July with a parent assembly and a family BBQ at the end of the day - A week’s summer school during the summer holidays -A 1-1 meeting with you, your child and their House Coach before term starts in September Following this induction, you will be invited to the Academy regularly for Progress Afternoons, Celebration Assemblies and other events.

Admissions Criteria

The PAN (Published Admission Number) for 2026-27 is 120 Year 7 students. A copy of the admissions policy is available on request or to download from our website. In the event of the school being oversubscribed, the following oversubscription criteria will apply:

- 1 Looked after Children or Previously Looked after Children as defined in section 22 (1) of the Children Act 1989. A previously Looked After Child is as stated in the Admissions Code 2021 paragraph 1.7.
- 2 Siblings – we will prioritise twins or children from other multiple births under the sibling criteria and would increase our published PAN to accommodate this need.

3 Children with exceptional medical or social needs as defined by a suitably qualified and experienced panel convened to consider such cases. Evidence in the form of a doctor or social worker’s letter will be required.

4 Children of staff at Oasis Academy South Bank, who have been in post for at least 2 years, or of staff recently appointed to a post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage

5 Up to 30 children who are currently on roll at Oasis Academy South Bank Primary and have attended the Academy since the beginning of Key Stage 2

6 Priority will be given to Pupil Premium applicants living closest to Oasis Academy South Bank, such that, including those admitted under criteria 1-5 above, the Year 7 Pupil Premium percentage is no lower than 60%. This is subject to sufficient applications from Pupil Premium families being received. When the 60% threshold is met, we will revert to criteria 7.

7 Distance – as measured by a straight line between the child’s home and the permanent site of the school. This measurement will be done by a computerised mapping system, from a point in the child’s home as identified by the software to a point at the school as profiled in the software. The child’s home address will be considered to be where the child spends the majority of the school week.

At Key Stage 3, pupils follow the national curriculum with a particular emphasis on the development of competences through an arts-based, skills-based programme as well as an academic pathway. E-learning, six-weekly assessments and careful target-setting are used to support personalised learning and many

opportunities are provided for pupils to develop their Business and Enterprise skills in real projects and to share their findings with others. Able, gifted and talented pupils are identified across the curriculum and are kept on target through regular monitoring of progress. The needs of our academically able pupils are also supported through our personalised academic programme, the Grammar School Pathway.

At Key Stage 4 the curriculum is rich and diverse with many different pathways designed to meet individual pupil’s needs. Pupils can take the English Baccalaureate subjects: English, Mathematics, Science, a language and either History or Geography. The school participates in the council’s co-ordinated procedure and all deadlines within that should be adhered to by applicants.

Priority admission
The school will give top priority to applications on behalf of children in the care, or all children previously in the care, of the local authority (‘looked after children’) residing with the primary carer with the relevant documentary evidence. Scholarships

In addition, a maximum of up to 10% of our admission number will be designated for scholarship applicants who show aptitude and interest in Art and Music. The school will also make available opportunities for the award of scholarships and bursaries to support pupils with marked aptitude in English, Maths, Science, Music, PE, Sports and Community Contribution.

Oversubscription

In the event of oversubscription in any ability band, priority will be given as according to the following criteria:

1. Children in the care, or previously in the care, of a Local Authority. 'Looked after children' refers to children who are (a) in the care of a local authority or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions at the time of making an application. If an application is made under the 'looked-after' criterion, it must be supported by a letter from the relevant local authority children's services department and/or relevant documents. 'Previously looked after children' refers to children who were looked after (as above), but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order) immediately after being looked-after.

2. Siblings of pupils who are attending the school at the time of the applicant's admission. 'Sibling' refers

to brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent/carer's partner where the child for whom the school place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling.

3. Where applications are received from twins, or same year siblings, if one child is selected for a scholarship place, or by another admission criterion, the other sibling will be admitted into their respective band.

4. Children of members of staff where the member of staff has been employed permanently at the school for two or more years at the time of application and will still be employed by the school on the date of admission.

5. Children of members of staff recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.

6. After applying the above criteria, random allocation within each ability band will be used for the remaining applicants and available places.

Admission Criteria

This is a summary of our Admissions Policy. To obtain a copy of the full policy before applying for a place, please see our website or contact the school.

As a Church of England school we provide an inclusive, caring and supportive environment where children of all faiths or none will learn and flourish.

We welcome applications from members of all faiths and non and we ask parents to support the Christian ethos of our school. Parents applying to Saint Gabriel’s do so in the understanding that we offer an education based on Christian principles, so the governors hope that all students will attend collective worship and Religious Studies lessons.

All Parents and carers applying for a place in Year 7 at Saint Gabriel’s College must complete the Common Application Form (CAF) from the Local Authority where the child lives and name this school as one of the preferences. Applicants for a Church place or a specialist music place must also complete the Saint Gabriel’s College Supplementary Information Form and return this to the school by the closing date.

Church Places

30 places each year are offered to children who themselves or whose parent/carer is a regular worshipper in a Christian church. To be considered for a Church place, the school’s Supplementary Information Form must be completed and signed by your priest/minister.

If there are more than 30 applicants who qualify for a Church place, places will be allocated according to the same criteria as for open places, with the additional criteria of children who themselves and/or whose parent/carer is a regular worshipper at a) St John the Divine Church, Kennington; b) an Anglican church; c) a Christian Church.

Unsuccessful applicants for Church places will be considered for open places.

Specialist Music Places

12 places each year are offered to children with the aptitude to benefit from a specialist course in music.

Places will be allocated on the basis of an aptitude test to include performance either as a vocalist or instrumentalist and a test of aural perception and awareness. To be considered for a specialist music place, the school’s Supplementary Information Form must be completed. Those not offered a specialist place will automatically be considered for an open place.

Open Places

78 places each year are offered to students who do not qualify or were unsuccessful in applying for a Church

place or specialist music place.

If there are more applications than places, places will be allocated according to the following criteria. These are stated in order of priority:

- i. Looked After Children, or previously Looked After Children.
- ii. Children with an exceptional and professionally supported medical or social need for a place at this school.
- iii. Children who will have a sibling in Saint Gabriel’s College at the time of admission.
- iv. Children whose parent/carer is a member of staff at Saint Gabriel’s College.
- v. Children who attend one of the following feeder primary schools: Christ Church SW9, Crawford, Jessop, John Ruskin, Loughborough, St Andrew’s Stockwell, St John’s Angell Town, St John the Divine, St Paul’s Walworth, Stockwell, Van Gogh, St Marks, St Saviour’s, Archbishop Sumner.
- vi. Children who live nearest to the school.

Enriched School Experience

The extra-curricular activities offered at Trinity Academy enrich the lives of our students and complement their academic studies. Widening our pupils’ horizons is fundamental to our ethos. We have an extended day for our Year 7 and Year 8 students, requiring their attendance in school until 4.30pm to attend at least one extra-curricular activity per week. This longer day gives students the opportunity to achieve their academic potential, learn a musical instrument, exercise regularly, and widen their horizons through a range of extra-curricular activities.

Free and autonomous

Trinity Academy – as part of the outstanding Future Academies Trust – is a state-funded, non-selective school open to members of all denominations and faiths and those with no religious backgrounds.

Admissions

Trinity Academy aims to serve communities from a broad swathe of SW London encompassing Clapham, Brixton and Balham and extending into Herne Hill, Tulse Hill, Streatham, Tooting, Stockwell, Vauxhall and parts of Battersea. Our admissions arrangements are designed to give families across this area a fair chance of gaining a place at the school. Trinity’s Admissions Policy is available on request and can be downloaded from the school’s website. We recommend you read the full document, but the main elements of the policy are summarised here:

Our Published Admissions Number

(PAN) for September 2026 entry is 130 Year 7 pupils.

Applicants with an Education, Health and Care Plan naming Trinity Academy on the Plan will be allocated places before all others.

If there are more applicants than places available for September 2026 entry, applicants will be ranked as follows:

- 1 A ‘looked after child’ or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

An adoption order is an order under the Adoption Act 1976 (see Section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (see Section 46 adoption orders). A ‘child arrangements order’ is an order settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live under Section 8 of the Children Act 1989 as amended by Section 14 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Section 14A

of the Children Act 1989 defines a ‘special guardianship order’ as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child’s special guardian (or special guardians).

Documentary evidence of status, in the form of a letter from a social worker, the Local Authority or other appropriate body (e.g. adoption agency) will be required. No further qualifying criteria apply to this category. A child in public care (looked after child) means a person under the age of 18 years who is provided by social services with accommodation by agreement with their parents/carers (Section 20 of the Children Act 1989) or who is the subject of a care order under Part IV of the Act. Children who are looked after under an agreed series of short-term placements (such as respite) are excluded. All applications under this criterion must be supported by a letter from the relevant Local Authority.

Siblings. Applicants who will have a sibling on the roll of the school in September 2026 will be ranked next. (Siblings include natural brothers and sisters, half-brothers/sisters, step-brothers/sisters, adopted or foster brothers/sisters.) Where applications are received from triplets, twins, other multiple births and other same-year siblings, places will be allocated to all the rest of the group of siblings straight after a place has been allocated to any one of them and all of any multiple birth/same-year sibling group will be offered places even if this means exceeding the PAN.

Children qualifying for the Pupil Premium/Service Premium will be prioritised next in the rankings for up to one third of all remaining places. Parents who want to take advantage of this preference should submit a Supplementary Information Form. If the number of applicants seeking preference under this criterion exceeds the number of places available, ranking within this category will be established by random allocation using a computer programme. You do not have to live in any particular geographical area to apply for preference under this heading. You can live anywhere. You qualify for the Pupil Premium if you have been eligible for free school meals at any time in the past six years. Further details about the Pupil Premium/Service Premium can be found in our admissions policy and guidance pages on the school's website.

Random Allocation – Inner Catchment Area and Outer Catchment Areas. The area serving the Academy is divided into an inner catchment area, defined as being covered by the following postcode areas: **SW2, SW4, SW8, SW9, SW11, SW12, SW16, SW17, SE5, SE11, SE17, SE19, SE21, SE24, SE25, SE27, CR4, CR7** and an outer catchment area, defined as being any area outside of the inner catchment postcode areas. Three fifths (60%) of any remaining places (the precise number being calculated using the standard rounding convention) will be allocated by random allocation to applicants living in the inner catchment area. One fifth (20%) of any remaining places (the precise number being calculated using the standard rounding convention) will be allocated by random allocation to applicants living in the outer catchment area. This process will be conducted using a computer programme and will be verified by an independent person of good standing.

Distance Criteria. All remaining applicants will be ranked on the basis of distance between the applicants' homes and the Trinity Academy reference point and places allocated accordingly (i.e. those living nearer to the reference point will be allocated places before those living further away). The reference point will be the centre of the learning campus site at 56 Brixton Hill where Trinity Academy is located.

Admissions criteria

All pupils being taught/on roll as a year 6 pupil at Woodmansterne

Primary during the academic year 2026-2027 and remain on roll during the Secondary Transfer application process, will be eligible to automatically transfer to the Woodmansterne secondary phase in

2026-2027. These children will be accommodated within the PAN of 150. This number is split between 120 places for the children who are currently on roll in year 6 at Woodmansterne School +30 new entrants to be admitted for year 7 through co-ordination = 150 children in year 7.

The oversubscription criteria for all new applicants, regardless of the year group will be the same as listed below:

1: Looked after children. The School Admissions Code 2021 states that: **A ‘looked after child’ or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).**

An adoption order is an order under the Adoption Act 1976 (see Section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (see Section 46 adoption orders). A ‘child arrangements order’ is an

order settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live under Section 8 of the Children Act 1989 as amended by Section 14 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 defines a ‘special guardianship order’ as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child’s special guardian (or special guardians). Children who are looked after under an agreed series of short-term placements (such as respite) are excluded. All applications under this criterion must be supported by a letter from the relevant Local Authority.

2: Siblings. Children with a brother or sister who already attends the school, and who will not have left the school at the time of admission. As a result siblings in Year 11 will not be regarded as a sibling under this criterion. A sibling is defined as a full/half/step brother or sister (who are living at the same address in all instances) or a child who is living as part of the family by reason of a court order, or a child who has been placed with foster carers at that address as a result of being looked after by the council.

However, children who are looked after under an agreed series of short-term placements (such as respite) will not be regarded as siblings under this criterion.

3: Children with exceptional medical or social needs. Children with a professionally supported medical or social need, whose application identifies a particular

school that is especially able to meet that need. This criterion will also take into account where a parent/carer has a physical, mental or social need that is significant and demonstrable for their child to attend a specific school. This does not include childcare arrangements. The decision to prioritise on these grounds will be determined via MEDSOC panel, which is comprised of the council’s senior management as well as senior school staff. Documents from an appropriate professional (e.g. GP, consultant or social worker letter or report, not including general information from a website) must support these applications. However, any supporting evidence does not automatically mean that applicants will gain priority in this criterion as the decision to prioritise under this criterion will solely rest with the MEDSOC panel.

There is no framework (statutory or otherwise) for a parent/carer to appeal against the decision of the MEDSOC Panel. All Panel decisions are final and are binding for both school and children.

4: Children of staff at the school. Applications for children of staff at the school. A member of staff for the purposes of this criterion must be employed by the said school as a teaching assistant or qualified teacher for a minimum of 0.6fte (16.5 hours teaching staff) and this employment must have been for at least 3 years at the time of submitting the application (i.e. their employment must have started no later than September 2022).

1. All such applications must be submitted to the MEDSOC Panel via a CAF submitted to the LA and must be accompanied with the relevant paperwork supporting an application on these grounds, e.g. a letter from the headteacher or other senior leadership team member. The applicant must take sole responsibility to provide such paperwork. Without the provision of the relevant papers which identify all the above, priority will not be given.

2. There will be a maximum priority limit of 4 children per year group for secondary schools/phase (years 7 to 11).

5: Distance. Priority will be given on the basis of distance between the child’s home and the school, measured by a straight-line. This measurement will be done using a computerized mapping system. This measurement will be from a point from the child’s home as identified by the software to a point at the school as profiled in the software.

As a **tiebreaker** for all criteria, priority will be given to children living closest to the preferred school (measured by a straight-line) in accordance with the measuring information in criterion 5. However, in the case where children have exactly the same distance between their home and the school, Lambeth LA will randomly allocate places as a tiebreaker.

Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP)

By the end of Summer term, parents/carers of children resident in Lambeth, with an EHCP, will receive a letter from Lambeth Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Team.

This letter will inform them about the process for transferring to secondary school and inviting them to notify Lambeth SEND of the names of their preferred schools. The SEND Team will process the application and then consult with those secondary schools.

The Local Offer

Lambeth sets out in its Local Offer the support available for local children and young people with SEND.
lambeth.gov.uk/SEND

The Local Offer has two main purposes:

- accessible and up-to-date information about available provision and how to access it, and
- responsive to local needs and aspirations by directly involving children with SEND and their parents, young people with SEND, and service providers in its development and review.

Lambeth Council’s principles for delivery of its local offer are:

- That the needs of children and young people are identified and assessed as quickly as possible and matched by appropriate provision,
- That parents, carers and the children and young people themselves are placed at the centre of the process.
- Health and Social Care work together in the total interest of the child, young person and their families, as laid out in the SEND Code of Practice January 2015.

Mainstream schools with provision for children with SEN

Dunraven School SLC Resource

Dunraven School has a provision for students with speech, language and communication needs via its Speech, Language and Communication Resource (SLCR). The SLCR can directly support up to 15 students in the 11-16 phase. Qualifying students must have an Education, Health and Care Plan clearly identifying

‘Communication and Interaction’ as their primary area of need, focusing on ‘developmental language disorder’.

As these students are all taught in mainstream classes, they must also be able to cope with the demands, structures and expectations of Dunraven’s mainstream environment.

The Elmgreen School Hearing Impairment Resource Base

The Hearing Support Department is the Lambeth secondary provision for students with a hearing loss and accompanying communication and learning needs who will benefit from specialist Teacher of the Deaf and Teaching Assistant (TA) support throughout the school day. The department is located within The Elmgreen School.

London Nautical Secondary School Autistic Spectrum Resource Base

is dedicated to Inclusion and is constantly developing support structures to meet the needs of pupils and the local community.

The ASD Resource Base at The London Nautical School is a unit within the school that offers help and support for children with an EHCP where the main need is autism. Our ASD Provision team includes specialist ASD teaching assistants, a HLTA and a specialist teacher who are managed and guided by the school’s Inclusion Manager. All students attend mainstream lessons, supported by a specialist Teaching assistant or HLTA. When students are not in lessons,

they are within the provision receiving additional individualised support. All of our staff have extensive knowledge and training on autism and inclusion.

The vision of our centre is that all students feel included and accepted, which will empower them to participate and make progress alongside their peers. We encourage our students to be as big a part of the mainstream school as possible, and want the provision to be an emotionally secure place for our students at times where they may find aspects of mainstream school demanding.
