

As the pandemic unfolded, we took urgent steps to re-target our grants programmes in response.

Brixton based architects Squire & Partners will continue their award winning Winter Windows installation – now in its fourth year – as a collaboration between local young people and the practice's modelmaking team. Previous installations have been created with Stockwell Primary, Hill Mead Primary and Landsdowne School. This year, recognising that opportunities are extremely limited for young people as we navigate through Covid-19, Squire & Partners is working with We Rise – the award winning local organisation working to empower young people – to offer a group of young adults the change to not only design the installation, but learn problem solving, software and technical skills to physically make the artworks too. It's hoped the project will become a valuable experience for their future careers.

Free meals for children

Lambeth Council provided free school meals to all school children in the borough who needed them during the school holiday in October.

A proposal to extend the current free school meals for school holidays nationally was voted down in Parliament, a decision that caused frustration to many families. Taking inspiration from Marcus Rashford's campaign, Lambeth Council took the decision to act locally and fund the free school meals programme for the October half-term to ensure that children that are most in need will be provided with vouchers over this holiday period. Cllr Jack Hopkins, Lambeth Council Leader, said: "Levels of poverty are only increasing due to the economic hardship of the Covid-19 pandemic

and now is the time for us all to recognise the need for compassion and support for all." Cllr Ed Davie, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People, said: "We've seen a powerful national campaign by Marcus Rashford that has forced action on the issue of child food poverty. We have done the same during summer holidays for many years. "The council will fund the scheme, costing approximately £165.000 and distribute it via vouchers. It will support over 10.000 children from families on low incomes."

SignLive Service

Sign Live, a live translation service enabling deaf residents to be able to communicate both face to face and via the telephone, went live in the Lambeth Customer Centre late in 2019. It is now also available when calling the Lambeth Call Centre. With the customer centre and many other Council offices closed due to the Covid-19 pandemic, it means that deaf residents can still contact the Council to access essential services.

The app is free for end users and can be downloaded onto a personal device (for example, mobile phone tablet or laptop) via the Sign Live web page: https://www.lambeth.gov.uk/signlive

Residents need to create an account using a one-time log in and then select one of the Lambeth tile options (from the community directory), where they will be connected to an interpreter.

Lambeth challenges government over statue 'power grab'

Lambeth Council has written to the Government calling for an urgent clarification after media reports claimed that Ministers could be set to restrict the power of local governments and their communities in making locally agreed changes to policies around statues and public heritage. Councillors have attended the meetings, alongside community and voluntary organisations, and the focus has been on listening to residents and their concerns.

Councillor Sonia Winifred, Cabinet Member for Equalities and Culture, who sent the letter, is leading a borough-wide public listening exercise with residents, community and faith-based groups to decide on the next steps to assess and review locations in the borough with historic direct and indirect links to the trans-Atlantic slave trade and colonialism.

Cllr Winifred said if the actions proposed by ministers reported in the media are correct, then would represent a "power grab that



would override the wishes of local communities" – and a decision that had been made without any consultation or engagement with local authorities.



ULEZ expanding

Air pollution is not just a central London problem. There are many areas still exceeding the legal limits for pollution across the city.

That is why from 25 October 2021, the central London Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) is expanded to create a single, larger zone up to the North Circular Road (A406) and South Circular Road (A205). The North and South Circular Roads themselves are not in the zone. This is part of the commitment by the Mayor and TfL to help every Londoner breathe cleaner air.

The ULEZ will continue to operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including weekends (except Christmas Day), with a £12.50 daily charge for vehicles that do not meet the required emissions standards.

Cars, motorcycles, vans and other specialist vehicles (up to and including 3.5 tonnes) and minibuses (up to and including 5 tonnes) will need to meet the required ULEZ emissions standards when driving within

and into the expanded zone, or pay a daily charge.

Four out of five cars already meet the ULEZ emissions standards, but we need owners of the remaining older cars, motorcycles, lighter vans and minibuses to take action.

Back in April, Lambeth became the first London borough to put in place a plan to protect residents from road danger and to enable more people to walk and cycle safely to keep our borough moving.

This was because during the first phase of lockdown, speeding on London's roads increased significantly. We also foresaw that as more people began to move around as restrictions eased, there would be a risk that our roads would be gridlocked by even more people – from both Lambeth and beyond – using a car to get around and overwhelming our streets.

Recent data published has shown this to be the case, with traffic levels regularly peaking over 150% of pre-coronavirus levels, meaning there is more traffic than ever on Lambeth's roads.

Therefore it is important to make our streets safer to enable people to walk, cycle, wheel or scoot safely to free up Lambeth's streets for those that need to use a car.

Safer streets for Lambeth

The Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, released his Streetspace Plan for London to guide our city through the significant transport challenges that coronavirus poses. Lambeth was allocated £2.6 million from Transport for London to make our streets safer and to enable safe walking, cycling, scooting and wheeling.

We have moved quickly since then to implement low traffic neighbourhoods to make our side streets safe to walk, wheel, cycle and scoot and have built new protected cycling infrastructure at several locations in the borough. We knew we had to enable our residents to continue to get around Lambeth safely – to get to the shops and local businesses, to the park and to schools –

particularly given that around 60% of households in our borough do not have access to a car.

Progress so far

Projects to make our streets safer extend from Oval to Stockwell, Railton, Ferndale, Streatham Hill and Tulse Hill. Additionally, we have built protected walking and cycling infrastructure on Kennington Road, Norwood Road and Rosendale Road.

We are closely monitoring the schemes and continue to make improvements off the back of feedback from local residents. We have made dozens of improvements already including enabling more people to shop locally by providing more cycle storage outside businesses, as

well as improving road markings to make it clearer for motorists. We are monitoring traffic flows inside and outside of the project areas, and we will be undertaking an air quality project to assess the changes in air pollution.

Emerging findings of council research shows an overall decrease in traffic across the area (including roads within and outside of the low traffic neighbourhood project), whilst numbers of people cycling on some key roads within the LTN have risen by 80%. We expect to see a more diverse group of people cycling too as our changes enable more children, women and Black, Asian and minority ethnic people – who are underrepresented when it comes to cycling – to pick up a cycle.

Look to the future

These schemes were implemented as emergency measures to mitigate the challenges posed to our transport system by Covid-19. Therefore we weren't able to conduct the deep consultation that we usually do on projects like these in Lambeth.

However we will be out and about in the community as much as Covid restrictions allow over the coming months, speaking to residents, schools, businesses and community organisations to hear from them. upCYCLE was founded in response to the Black Lives Matter movement and the adverse effect that Covid-19 was having on London's ethnic minority community. We work out of The Remakery in Brixton and have one simple mission: to take second-hand or unused bikes and refurbish them before donating them to charities that specialise in working with young people from ethnic minority groups, so they have a free and safe way to travel. 

Applications open

Residents looking to reduce their domestic energy bills and environmental impact can access a government voucher scheme worth up to £5,000 or £10,000 to help cover the cost of making energy efficient improvements to homes.

Improvements could include insulating homes to reduce energy use or installing low-carbon heating to lower the amount of carbon dioxide people's home produces. People must redeem the voucher and ensure improvements are completed by 31 March 2021.

Residents can apply for the voucher online. People can find out if they're eligible for the Green Homes Grant scheme and see what improvements can be made to their home at gov.uk/guidance/apply-for-the-green-homes-grant-scheme

Advice on grants

One way homeowners could make use of the grants is through Ecofurb (ecofurb.com/), which offers advice on which improvements will have the biggest impact on the energy efficiency of their home, getting quotes from vetted local contractors and provide quality assurance.

Lambeth, which was the first local authority in the country to declare a Climate Emergency, has had to delay its Citizens' Assembly due to the Covid-19 crisis, but the borough and its partners remain

committed to holding the summit and developing the local actions needed.

To continue to lead the fight against the climate crisis and build a green recovery from Covid 19 the council has launched the Lambeth Climate Action Hub. This gives residents, business and community groups a platform to come together on line, to share projects, experience, ideas and solutions to build a cleaner and greener Lambeth.

Together with onHand we've been able to help the community at a time when we needed it most. Every day we hear wonderful stories of long-lasting friendships from our residents.

Earlier this year onHand partnered with Lambeth Council to provide the residents help with simple tasks. From May to September, onHand has helped 227 people with a whopping 1500 missions in the borough!

Volunteers have dropped shopping off to those in need, provided some much needed companionship over the phone and run other errands. Partnering with onHand meant the council could reduce the significant cost of sending out food parcels to residents who are shielding and unable to leave home. The service was more efficient too! The residents could write their own shopping lists based on what they needed.

Since welcoming Lambeth Council's volunteers to the onHand team, they have been verified, DBS checked and now manage their missions through the onHand app, making it a smooth journey for volunteers and residents alike. Electoral Registration and GLA Elections 2021

The Electoral Services team have been busy contacting every household in the borough of Lambeth to confirm details for over 240,000 voters, with canvassers making visits to assist residents in providing this information. The canvass is now complete, and the 2021 Register of Electors was published on 1 December 2020.

Electoral Services will be sending a **Household Notification Letter (HNL)** to every residential property in early 2021 containing the names of people registered to vote at each address. There is no need to respond to the HNL unless voter details at your address have changed.

If you, or someone in your household, still needs to register to vote please visit **gov.uk/register-to-vote**.

On Thursday 6 May 2021 GLA elections for the Mayor of London and London Assembly will take place. Make sure you are registered to vote in advance by visiting the above website.

Her colleague Andrew Eyres, strategic director at the **South East London CCG** and Lambeth Council, said Williams-McKoy, a nurse consultant and designated nurse in child protection, "has worked tirelessly and inspiringly to provide leadership, vision and clinical expertise to the vital work of the LSCB, and her drive and persuasiveness have embedded a robust approach to protecting vulnerable children and families across all Lambeth partners."

Eyres, who has worked with Avis since 2002, acknowledged the "great debt [owed] for her compassion expertise and strategic thinking over the years" by Lambeth Council, the local NHS and residents alike. We caught up with Avis to find out a little more about her...

Are you Lambeth born and bred?

Made In Lambeth, yes! I'm proud to say that I'm one of Lambeth daughters. Living and working in the borough is my day to day experience. Lambeth's diversity and culture is for me – and many of my colleagues – the beating pulse of our hearts.

When did you start working in Lambeth?

I starting working in the borough in the early 1990s. I returned back to Lambeth from north London, where I had been working in Islington, and started in a position as a health visitor in the community in Brixton and Clapham. It was a fantastic public health role where I was working with a caseload of about 300 families.

What have been the key moments of your working life?

There have been several important mileposts in my career: in 2019, I was awarded the Putting People First Award at The Lammys, for helping to improve safety for children in Lambeth. In 2013. I received the Queen's Medal as part of the Diamond Jubilee Celebration. The year before that, I was awarded the Nola Ismel Award from the Windrush and Beyond Foundation for services towards the Improvement of children's health. Oh and in 2011 I went to a Royal garden party, on behalf of Unite the Union.

What have been the greatest challenges and successes?

These are both intertwined for me: being a mum. I have three awesome sons.

What does a normal day hold for you?

No two days are the same, I have an amazing job. On any given day, I could be delivering teaching lessons, chairing a meeting, writing polices and reports, or supporting a practitioner, meeting with members of the safeguarding partnership and or working together with health colleagues.

What are you looking forward to the most in the next year?

Outside work: going to the theatre, dancing (I'm a big Lovers Rock fan), meeting friends and family, hopefully getting on a plane for a holiday abroad!

Work: It would be lovely to meet colleagues face to face again. I never thought I'd miss traveling on the 159 or the 2 bus.

What do you do to relax?

I listen to music, play dominoes, and just enjoy some down time with my sisters and friends

What motivates you?

Lambeth's children and their families. Knowing that I can contribute by working in partnership with others to improve the wellbeing of our communities – children, young people and their families – is motivation enough.

And finally, have you got an outfit planned for the Palace?

No idea about an outfit yet – give girl a chance to think! This requires strategic planning with possibly long-term parallel plans... My biggest consideration will be finding a fascinator hat to compliment my dreadlocks.



Others question whether any information that they can give would actually be of any use. Again, it's stressed that the smallest things, which may seem unimportant, can actually be critical to the progress of an investigation into a violent crime.

The independent charity
Crimestoppers, has launched a
campaign called Hard Calls Save
Lives which aims to remove some
of the barriers that members of
communities can feel when it
comes to reporting incidents of

violent crime – especially knife crime.

All information is reviewed, and where possible, acted upon, to help to stop crime. You will be listened to as you are likely to know best when things don't feel right in your neighbourhood. Crimestoppers will know what to do with your concerns and pass it on for you anonymously, without any judgment.

The campaign which launched in September 2020, makes it clear that calls to Crimestoppers

on their hotline are totally anonymous: they are not recorded or traced, and neither Crimestoppers or the police will know who has made the call.

Crimestoppers says:

"Every little bit of information is useful in the fight against knife crime. We know that it can be difficult to pick up the phone but sharing what you know with us anonymously can help to make our communities safer. If something doesn't feel right, call us on 0800 555 111."

These are listed below, in order of how much they cost the council to run, with the cheapest at the top which is Direct Debit:

Direct Debit: This is the council's preferred method for bills to be paid if you make weekly or monthly payments. You can use this to pay your council tax, rent or service charges monthly. All you need to do is to fill in a form telling your bank or building society to make a payment each month. The details for setting up direct debits can be found on your bill.

Online: You can use this to pay most council bills including council tax, rent and service charges using your debit card/credit card. Use www.lambeth.gov.uk/make-a-payment

Telephone payments: You can use this to pay most council bills using your debit card/credit card, including council tax, rent and service charges. Simply call 020 8290 2086.

At your post office: Just take your council bill to your local post office and they will take your payment in cash or using your debit card/credit card.

At your bank or building society: Just take your council bill to your bank or building society and they will take your payment in cash or using your debit card/credit card.

At any shop that displays the PayPoint sign:

You can make many payments using PayPoint. If a PayPoint sign and barcode are printed on your bill, just take it to your local shop and they will take your cash or card payment. Was your child born between 01/09/16 and 31/08/17?

It's available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, up until the admissions closing date, which is midnight **Friday 15 January 2021. If you apply after this date the likelihood of gaining a place at your preferred school may be significantly reduced.**

Loughborough Farm's 'Growing Wellbeing in Loughborough Junction' project was a communityled Projects That Matter competition winner back in March where they were given a £1,000 from Lambeth Council to kick start their project - shortlisted from 30 applicants. Now their project is going live to help local people through this first Covid-19 winter, with support from community crowdfunding and more from Crowdfund Lambeth.

Coin Street is a social enterprise, which from a derelict site in 1984, has created a thriving, diverse, vibrant and welcoming place – the Southbank riverside. The income Coin Street receives from commercial activities, such as letting spaces to independent businesses, helps to fund its many community activities, including childcare, family support, wellbeing services and much more

From March to October 2020, Coin Street supported 1,040 Waterloo and North Southwark residents weekly. During this time, Coin Street delivered over 13,000 meals, gave out over 263 activity and care packs, helped children attending Coin Street's summer camp to

access 168 take and make food boxes, provided 70 grocery packs and ran countless virtual sessions weekly for people to stay connected to their community.

Coin Street continues to support the local community by delivering food and running virtual sessions, as well as presenting a range of events including Gentle Gardening, Youth Night, Family Fitness & Fun, and Over 50s Art Group, all held weekly. Of the art sessions, one attendee said, "Lockdown has been difficult at times, but the inspiring art sessions helped me fight the 'Lockdown inertia' and paint again."


