

2014 Residents Survey findings Corporate performance and the Cooperative Council



The Good News

- Satisfaction with the way the Council runs things and perceived value for money have increased significantly since last year.
- Residents continue to feel more informed about the Council's services and benefits than they did two years ago.

Resident's priorities

- Residents rate crime reduction, clean streets and public transport as the top three most important things that make their local area a good place to live.
- Clean streets, crime reduction and road and pavement repairs are thought by residents to be most in need of improvement.
- Residents think that the Council should prioritise spending on ensuring Lambeth is a safe and friendly place to live and ensuring that Lambeth is a clean and environmentally sustainable.



Area specific findings

- Residents in Clapham are no longer less likely to feel they can influence decisions in their local area, however they are less likely to feel that they are informed about the services and benefits the Council provides.
- Clapham residents along with residents in North Lambeth are more likely to say that the Council should prioritise spending on supporting vulnerable people in the community.
- Residents in Streatham are more likely to think that the Council should prioritise spending on helping young people to achieve their ambitions.
- Residents in Brixton and Clapham are also less likely to feel informed about the Council's services and benefits.
- Stockwell residents are more positive about a number of measures of cooperative working. They are also more likely to rate levels of crime as important in making Lambeth a good place to live



Cooperative working

- Residents are positive about cooperative working, more than half say that residents work with each other to help make improvements and more than half say that the Council consults residents before they make changes to the local area and services. Nearly a third of residents say they are likely to get involved with others on decision making or making improvements to the area in the future. Lambeth based business owners are the most likely to say they will get involved.
- Retired and disabled residents along with people who rent from the Council and people from White Other backgrounds are more likely not to participate in a group, club or organisation.
- People are now more likely not to participate in any group, club or organisation (74%), compared with November 2012 (56%).



Equality issues

- Black residents are more likely to be dissatisfied with the local area as a place to live.
- Black Caribbean residents are more likely to be dissatisfied with the value for money provided by the council and more likely to be dissatisfied with the way the Council runs things. Black Caribbean residents are less likely to use the internet and so this should be taken into consideration when communicating with Black Caribbean residents. Black Caribbean residents are more likely to say that the Council should prioritise spending on better quality homes and on the Lambeth economy and employment.
- Residents with caring responsibilities continue to be dissatisfied with the way the Council runs things and dissatisfied with the local area as a place to live. They are now also more likely to say that the Council does not provide value for money and to feel that the Council does not keep them informed about the services and benefits it provides. Carers are more likely to say that the Council should prioritise spending on supporting vulnerable people in the community and helping young people to achieve their ambitions.



Equality issues

- Disabled people continue to be more likely to have no access to the internet. They are also more likely to say that they will not get involved in decision making and improving the local area and so care should be taken to ensure that this group are not further marginalised and that they are encouraged to have their say in how things are done in the borough.
- People with a long term illness are also more likely to have no access to the internet. They are more likely to feel that they cannot influence decisions in the local area and the are more likely to say that the Council should prioritise spending on supporting vulnerable people in the community.




Corporate Performance



Satisfaction with the council and VfM ratings have both increased since last year.

Residents who think that the area is not one where people from different backgrounds get on well together are more likely to be dissatisfied with the local area as a place to live. Black residents and those with caring responsibilities continue to be dissatisfied with the local area as a place to live.





Internet Access



More than 8 out of 10 residents access the internet at home and two thirds of residents access the internet by mobile phone, however nearly one of ten residents do not have access the internet. Internet users are also more likely to feel that they can influence decisions in the local area.

Despite such a large proportion of residents having access to the internet, older and retired people, Black Caribbean disabled people and residents who are not in a job or training continue to be more likely to <u>not</u> to have access to the internet. People who do not use the internet are also more likely to feel they cannot influence decisions.




Influencing Decisions



Priorities



More than half of residents think that the council should prioritise spending on ensuring that Lambeth is a safe and friendly place to live.

Owners of a business outside of Lambeth are the most likely to think the council should prioritise spending on making Lambeth a safe and friendly place to live. It is also a very high priority for household with two adults and children and for residents who have lived in the area for 5 - 10 years.

Qualitative research shows that there is a strong feeling that crime reduction will not be achieved without attention to wider social and economic issues. There is a perceived correlation between greater employment, more support for teenagers, better quality housing, less disparity between schools and even drug decriminalisation.

Newer residents in particular are more likely to think that the council should prioritise spending on ensuring Lambeth is a clean and environmentally sustainable place to live.

Qualitative research shows that residents see the council is as an enforcer of policies but ultimately the individual has to make an informed choice about pursuing a more environmentally sustainable lifestyle.

Black Caribbean residents, social tenants and residents who use the housing advice and allocation service think the council should prioritise spending on opportunities for better quality homes. This is also a key priority for residents in the Stockwell area.

Qualitative research found this to be one of the most emotive topics and most people have had direct or indirect experience of housing issues. Residents think that housing stock is in poor condition and new social housing is in very short supply. The Council is perceived to be responsible for this because it holds the housing stock.

Young people are more likely to think the council should prioritise spending on helping them to achieve their ambitions, though this was not their top priority. Young people's top priority for spending is on ensuring Lambeth is a safe and friendly place to live. Residents in Streatham are more likely to prioritise spending on young people.

Qualitative research found that residents see a significant overlap between this and the job skills outcome, as well as selfworth having a tangible effect on crime reduction. But residents say that society in general plays a part in young people's selfesteem/self-belief and people say that a sense of someone believing in you also come from the family, or school, or youth centres, etc. (Community outcomes research 2014)

Despite this not ranking highly in the residents survey, support for vulnerable adults and children was ranked second (crime reduction was ranked first) by residents in qualitative research. Residents think this is a core function for the Council and identify links between this and crime prevention. There is also a strong sense that the community has to be responsible for helping people who are troubled, where possible e.g. relevant community organisations who understand what's going on at a grassroots level. Black Caribbean residents and people aged 25 – 34 are more likely to say the council should prioritise spending on supporting the Lambeth economy and employment

In qualitative research residents rated people having the skills to find work as the number 3 priority (after crime reduction and supporting vulnerable children and adults). There is great consistency in the suggestions about how we should encourage this e.g. apprenticeships. It is perceived as having a very strong link into positive outcomes around crime reduction. In qualitative research, residents said that the council can promote attitudes or events, information about healthy food and subsidised leisure and exercise. But there's also an equally significant role for individuals to make personal commitments and for the government/NHS to instigate/promote policies.





Q6: And what are the things that most need improving?



% feeling important









Residents are most likely to want to get involved in environmental or conservation issues, working with young people and community safety issues.


Q20: If you are likely to get involved which areas might you get involved with?

Methodology – residents' survey

- This is the first year of a new annual residents survey conducted by BMG for Lambeth Council. Previous Lambeth residents' survey were carried out every six months from November 2011 and April 2014, and quarterly between October 2009 and October 2001.
- In this survey, 1013 interviews were completed with adults (aged 18+). The fieldwork for this survey was carried out in residents' homes using computer assisted personal interviewing (CAPI) between 14th May and 15th June 2014. Data are weighted to gender, age, work status and ethnicity. Data was sampled at 105 sampling points compared with 42 sampling points in the previous residents' survey. Quotas were set on gender, age, and ethnicity.
- The survey is significantly different in ordering and content to previous residents' surveys with the addition of some new questions and so comparisons need to be made with caution.
- IMD: The Index of Multiple Deprivation by the Office for National Statistics is measured at super output area. It is a geographical measure of deprivation on a scale of 1 to 5, with 1 being the most deprived and 5 being the least deprived. The IMD for each respondent's address was attached in the data preparation stage. Findings regarding IMD should be interpreted with caution as people from different socio-economic backgrounds can live within the same super output area in Lambeth.
